Something new in microbes. It has been discovered that the growth of plants depends on the growth and flour-inling of certain microbes in the soil. These microbes are what age added to the earth with organic fertilizing. It is suggested that our government chemists experiment with these microbes, find out what they are and then cultivate them, sow them in the soil and watch results. If the experiment is successful then the government can cultivate fertilizing microbes and ship them throughout the country, as garden seeds are now sent. The time may be comitted, when, instead of hauling and spreading bully car loads and wagon loads of fertilizers, the gardener will have only to take out this little bottle of microbes and sprinkle them lightly and delicated over
