OBITUARY.

George Kendall, an old resident of the city, died at his residence, 195 Fountain street, at 4 o'clock yesterday morning. He had been in poor health for several years, but it was not until about a week ago, when he caught a severe cold, that his illness assumed an alarming turn.

Mr. Kendall was born at Greenfield, Franklin county, Mass., December 13, 1818. He was the son of Lyman and Martha Clay (Goodwin) Kendall. The former was a native of Ashford, Conn., and died at Cleveland, O., February 9, 1847. The latter was born at Putney, Vt., and died in this city July 27, 1874.

Mr. Kendall, Sr., went to Cleveland when that city had not over 2,500 inhabitants. George Kendall received a common school education and attended Greenfield academy two years. In April, 1836, he traveled through the country prospecting tour and spent a Sunday in Grand Rapids. In August, 1840, he came to Kalamazoo and engaged in mercantile operations and in 1844 to Chicago, Ill., and died in this city on the morning of the 19th inst. He was buried in the cemetery of the city on the 21st inst. He was married May 23, 1844, at Adams, Mich., to a daughter of a farmer who has had four children, three of whom are yet living. They are Mrs. J. Edinborough, Mrs. J. C. P. H. H. and George T. Their only son, died May 11, 1877.

The funeral will take place from the residence at 11:30 tomorrow afternoon.

THE PETERS FAILURE.

Simply because E. G. Peters has failed and pulled down with him his many partners in business no more than nervous and panicky over the general business situation.

It is beyond denial a fact that the volume of money in the country is too small, but it is also true that what money we have is perfectly good because this great government endorses or issues every dollar of it and will take nearly all of it in payment of debt and compel citizens to do like.

It is also true that the banks are in a sound condition and a limited amount of money can be had by any honest, safe business man in this city at 8 percent interest per annum.

The failure of Peters will be deeply regretted throughout his wide acquaintance. He is a man of enterprise, energy and liberality. He is a man who keeps every dollar within his reach moving and gives employment to nearly 200 men. However, it can be said of Mr. Peters that he is speculative and venturesome to a degree that is dangerous, and all there is about it, he ventured too far.

If the nation had a sufficient volume of money issued by the government, Mr. Peters would be safe today and worth more than the millions that have been credited to him.

The Greenback party policy was right in right today and ever will be right. That policy would make men like Mr. Peters prosperous and dry up the business of mere money sharks who specialize for their victims such as he is.

Greenbackism has no particular party exponent, but its essential doctrine have been espoused by every party in Michigan but the Republican. The prohibitionists, the farmers, the industrialists and the Democrats have all declared for a government issue of money and free silver currency.

The Republican party is too much in the control of the money power and never was so wrong as now when it refuses manufacturing by a high protective system and refuses the money necessary to enlarge the means of the home purchasers.

The McKinley bill has created an unusual antagonism by stimulating importations to a speculative degree that is going to prove a great loss to the government in revenue and that a time will embarrass many manufacturers and speculators like Mr. Peters.

KNOW-NOTHINGISM REVIVING.

The so-called school house issue in the Illinois election is assuming a new meaning. Religious denominations maintaining prohibitions are being made the special object of attack. Members of the Catholic church who are candidates for office are making themselves "know-nothing" on whatever ticket they are placed.

The school house is in no more danger than at any time in the past hundred years during which time it has been built up to a splendid acrobat that reach from the kindergarten to the university.

Know-nothingism is intolerable. Its patriotism is bigotry. The party that is justly expatriated of that will perish. The sick sense of demagoguism can not hide its hateful un-American heart.

And yet there is a certain degree of Americanism that would be popular. Reform in the laws for the protection of desirable in order that vice, ignorance and crime shall be forbidden our shores from other countries, but when a man comes here and becomes a citizen he is just as good as the best of us. He behaves himself, whether he is Catholic or protestant, Jew or Gentile.

When the cable street railway has purchased the old street railway and consolidated the two systems into one and the new management shows itself for approval or disapproval it will be time enough to regret the change or rejoice over it. Perhaps the change won't occur. Perhaps electricity as a motor won't be abandoned. Perhaps we will have rapid transit in any event. If the public has good sense to regret the change, if it occurs. If it does not occur, the public will find itself in more trouble than the public. Whoever owns these splendid franchises must catch the energetic spirit of Grand Rapids or get left.
