HOME GOVERNMENT.

It is quite possible that Gov. Campbell of Ohio will be beaten by the legislature in his brave effort to overthrow corrupt board government in Cincinnati.

"Home government" means elective offices from the people, and not a government by boards appointed by anyone.

They are just as capable of nominating and electing members of important boards, and judges, too, for that matter.

It is true the local legislatures of the cities have developed a shameful disposition to dishonesty in the granting of valuable franchises.

The jobs that thicken the air of council rooms and aldermanic chambers outnumber the larger jobs that permeate the legislatures and congress.

It is not a question but that the legislation of the nation, from village council up to congress, is more or less tainted with jobs that enrich the dishonest official and rob the people.

It is deplorable that it is so. But it will not help matters to vent city power over franchises and patronage in appointive bodies.

The nominating convention is just as liable to select a rood man for its candidate as is a governor or mayor, for while the people are liable to elect a man who may have a price springing from a desire to get more money than he has, the governor or mayor is liable to appoint a partisan so intense in his party devotion that he cannot, or will not, see the public interest.

A candidate before the people must pass the close scrutiny of the public organs, and if he is tainted or stained he is usually defeated. The men who dominate in the votes of the people are more careful how they respect the wishes of the people than men who get office from a power above the people.
