An Undertaker's Confession

The Kansas undertakers have concluded to have a public meeting in this city in the state to bury all the dead and propose to form a combine against new firms. Some hundred or more undertakers are expected to attend, and a scheme has been formulated by which the men now in business will monopolize the trade. No publicity has been given the meeting, and when questioned by newspaper correspondents they declare the organization was simply a matter of business.

In speaking of the business transaction of one of the members said: "We simply organized our own business, and will keep down the number of men in the state who engage in the undertaking business. Our object is to buy out those firms which sell to them, and from down in every way on new firms. It is simply a matter of self protection for us, as there are already more undertakers in the state than the business demands."—Cor. Kansas City Times.

An Extraordinary Tow

The Leary raft towing venture is about to be cast in the water by the occurrence of a heavy frost of fat boats. The powerful ocean tugs Haviland and Heperhansa have left the harbor for the purpose of towing great Nicaragua canal plant to the scene of operations.

An ocean voyage with a mammoth dredge and a dozen scows will be made along the coast to the West Indies and thence to Greytown, Nicaragua. The dredge is now awaiting the tug at Charleston, S. C., where it was constructed. After the big tug has left with their burden it is estimated that some 100 barges will be necessary to bring the unwieldy burden into Greytown harbor.—New York Telegram.

Indian Getting Restless

Capt. Trimble, of the Seventh United States cavalry, passed through Pigeon Bay a few days ago on his way from Fort Sill, T. L., to New York, and conversed with a Chronicle-Telegraph reporter on the Indian situation in the Indian reservation. He said: "No one who is in the Indian reservations can comprehend the almost unbounded amount of the dissatisfaction that the Great Medicine Man is once more about to visit the earth. Thousands of Indians are forsaking their homes and agricultural occupations to seek in solitude where they are not contented with their lot to welcome the Great Medicine Man."

The effect of the banatical preachings of certain tribal leaders is proving a source of grave alarm. One part of the religious excitement is a talk with the Washita river. On the banks of that stream they expect the Medicine Man to appear, who is to exterminate the white race, and once again appoint the country out for the tribes of Indians. I believe that there will be a serious outbreak among the Indians as a result of this religious excitement. The sight of 10,000 Indian braves and squares before the Washita river every morning to bathe and chant wild dirges is calculated to excite apprehension among army officials and white settlers alike."

Melons by Mail

We lunched today on melons sent from the south of Germany through the mails. It costs twelve cents to send three melons 200 miles; this is a tribute to the mail and the quality of the fruit expressed. You may send fluids, fruit and anything but explosives through the German mails, only the fluids must be carefully wrapped and marked if perishable. It is melancholy that our American mails exclude melons and so on. If you want to get a direct supply of dozon oranges in a place where oranges cannot be found, the German mail will care for them, and here at the castle, six miles from a melon we do all our shopping by the Royal Mail.—Cor. Lewiston Journal.
