The Supervisors Seized With a Spasm of Economy.

The morning session of the board of supervisors yesterday was uneventful. In the afternoon, however, they got down to business and adopted the report of the committee on equalization, cut down everybody's salary but their own, and broke up in something very like a huff.

The report of the committee on equalization was adopted just as it came from the hands of the committee, but not without considerable jangling. It is doubtless a matter of great importance, except possible one or two of those who made up the report, are satisfied with it, but when any member attempted to get what he considered justice for his town, he immediately found himself in a quagmire.

Two reports upon salaries were submitted. The minority report was signed by Messrs. Sullivan, Maynard and the majority report signed by Messrs. Gould and Emmons, was as follows: \$600 deputy treasurer, \$600 clerk, \$600 auditor, \$600 assessor, \$600 collector, \$600 members of the soldiers' relief commission, \$3 a day and 6 cents mileage for necessary travel; board of prisoners at the jail, 40 cents a day and washing 5 cents a day for each day.
