A FAIR AND AN INSULT.

In the Telegram-Herald yesterday morning there appeared over the cognate signature of Prof. C. G. Swenberg, proprietor of the Telegram-Herald, a remarkable article relative to city governments.

The gist of the argument was: "Let the city be strictly controlled by a corporate body and governed exclusively and strictly by those who have direct pecuniary and tax-paying interest in the property of the city."

This principle comprehensively interpreted would throw open the polls more widely than at present, for there is not an adult in the city who has not a direct pecuniary and tax paying interest in the city.

The house which shelters his family and has not a dollar's worth of taxable property, is one of those who, the Telegram-Herald says, should not have a voice in electing the city officials, but in reality he has just as much pecuniary and taxable interest as his neighbor.

The water board increases water rates, the tenant pays the fire tax, the highway tax, in fact all the taxes. The landlord merely acts as a sort of middleman to collect the taxes and pay them over to the city.

And in doing it he is sure to collect a handsome fee for himself in the way of interest. Has the tenant then no interest in the choice of the men who are to vote these taxes which he is to pay? Certainly, and no one has greater.

The city officers also frame the laws for the conduct of the citizens. They fix the amount of license for peddlers, for expressmen and callings. It is in these laws no interest in the men who will vote tax them for trying to earn an honest living?

The city, forsooth, is a "corporate, not a political body." The Telegram-Herald seems to be "for" the corporations. It invariably stands by them as against the people. Witness its course in street railway matters, and in water supply matters. It now goes a step further and says that the government is "a farce and an insult."

THE ORIGIN OF CRIME. Crime is not on the decrease. On the contrary it is increasing, and this civilization is confronted, in this state of things, with a problem of the most serious character.

How can crime be suppressed? What is the common origin of crime? The prohibitionists say intemperance is the common origin of crime. It is true, regarded as a first cause, but beyond that is the cause that makes drunkards. After all, are not criminal dispositions inherited?

We need criminals' best criminals. It is this, is it, fitly to right crime by state prisons, or even the gallows. The confirmed criminal would be deprived of the power to perpetrate his kind. This would be more terrible a deterrent than even death itself.
