Chicago's oldest colored resident, Mrs. Ruth Ann Hilton, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. R. Patterson, 2,016 Butterfield street, about three months ago. Mrs. Hilton was 110 years of age at the time of her death. She was born in Butler county, Va. Her parents were freed slaves, and she was one of the first four of whom are living.

The old lady was a remarkable woman in many respects. Until her death she retained her faculties, and just a week before her death left the house for a walk of several blocks.
