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THE PEOPLE'S COLUMN.
The Landlord and the Soldiers' Home.
EDITOR MORNING PRESS—For some time I have been almost persuaded to send you my congratulations on your good conduct, but I have hesitated, fearing that you would become altogether too vain, being so young in the newspaper world. Your late editorial entitled "Reform Demanded," so pleased me that I can no longer refrain from expressing my hearty approval of your course from the very start. You have filled a long felt want by an independent newspaper of dignity and fairness. Long may you wave.

The special thing that interested me, however, was your allusion to the Soldiers' Home. I understood to be something "of a crank" on that subject, having kept the affairs of that institution quite prominently before the public for some months past. While I can not approve of some things you uttered concerning the past management of the home, feeling that they were much over-stated, I am glad to see that you have minded citizens that the affairs should be fully investigated, but by a non-partisan, or at least one who can be trusted to be evenly divided.

Of course, Gen. Pierce will be invited to resign, if he does not do so voluntarily, and I can fully sympathize with him when he has to pack up and move out, for I know how low he has been treated, and how ready under such circumstances he will not wish to leave a cloud. I believe he will welcome a searching examination of the books, and of making a list of those who have been charged with official corruption in the management of the Soldiers' home may be forever silenced.

Certainly, any attempt to evade such an account of his conduct of affairs would be fatal to his reputation; and on this account the sooner Gen. Winans orders an investigation, the more will be better for all concerned, and I trust there will not be even a suspicion of why.

The reading public of this vicinity will bear me record that I have never in my past work made any even situation that there was any "official corruption" at the Soldiers' Home. I never saw anything to make me think that there could be any misuse of its funds.

I have complained of Gen. Luce's petty attempt to introduce economy in the wrong direction. I have never been able to comprehend why the chaplain of the home should be put on the sidewalk with the general's waiter, or below it, as regards salary, or why I was permitted to fulfill the duties of the Soldiers' office for over three years, yet be refused the salary attached. These are minor matters which I trust God will settle, but they in no way reflect upon the propriety of the management.

I have with considerable interest the record of the Soldiers' Home under the Democratic administration.

Raffles and Lotteries.

If I am mistaken in my idea of the fair I shall be glad to know it. If not, and the fair is a lottery scheme, I hope that those whose duty it is to prosecute will do their duty.
