JUSTIN MCCARTHY LEADS THE REVOLT AGAINST HIM.

And Forty-Five Nationalists Walk out of the Conference—Parrell Refuses to Entertain a Motion Against Himself.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Irish Nationalist conference, with Mr. Parrell in the chair, met in its room at the hour of noon and resumed its deliberations. Mr. Redmond, chairman of the special conference, presided.

Parrell's speech was greeted with a storm of applause. He then turned to the question of the chairmanship, and Mr. McCarthy stood up and demanded that Parrell should be removed from the chair.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Kennedy and carried. Mr. McCarthy then proposed a motion for the removal of Parrell from the chair.
