

HE CAPTURES THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINATION FOR SPEAKER

Richardson Will be Speaker Pro Tem—Winner for President of the Senate and Speaker of the House with J. J. Emery as Assistant.

LANSING, Jan. 6.—The Democratic legislative caucus was held tonight. They were right lively gatherings and the proceedings, while orderly, were characterized by more spirit and determination than has been expected.

The house caucus convened at 7 o'clock with W. Wendell of Detroit presiding, and the veteran Republican clerk, Dan L. Crossman, acting as secretary.

Speaker Doy of Chicago presiding, nominated Philip B. Wachtel of Detroit, and the nomination was seconded by White of Grand Rapids and Lanabert of Niles.

Jackson of Monroe county nominated C. S. Sargent and J. Jackson of Wayne endorsed the views of his name.

Barkworth of Jackson presented Richardson of Ottawa and the nomination was supported by C. S. Sargent.

Wm. E. Henze of Wayne nominated Judge Miner of Detroit. Through six informal ballots the contest was sharp without a choice, but on the seventh Wachtel received a majority.

On motion of Judge Miner the ballot was declared formal. Richardson was sustained by a majority of 65 yeas and 10 nays.

The clerk of the house Mr. J. M. Pleasant withdrew and Brant had a walk-away. E. M. Hopkins of Mt. Pleasant was named for engraving and enrolling clerk.

For sergeant-at-arms the candidates were W. C. Mackinac and J. J. Mackinac. Mackinac is the lucky man.

The Senate. LANSING, Jan. 5.—The P. of I. senators were not inclined to join in the Democratic caucus, they were finally brought into the fold.

Senator W. C. Mackinac was nominated for president pro tem; A. J. Murphy of Detroit, for secretary; J. J. Emery of Grand Rapids, for assistant secretary; and J. A. W. H. of Huron county, for sergeant-at-arms.

The Republican members of the house caucus tomorrow morning. George Hill of Michigan was appointed clerk of the senate clock room.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The Republicans generally regard the action of the senate yesterday as fatal to the election bill. Democrats do not differ with them in this point, but their enthusiasm is tempered by their fears.

The passage through both houses of a bill containing a provision for free coinage of silver is now regarded as probable unless the radical anti-silver men in the senate bring to filibuster against the measure and talk of death.

Not enough time has passed yet to disclose just what the policy of the anti-silver men will be. It is probably within their power to prolong the discussion of the bill for several days.

Friends of silver, however, predict that the bill will pass the senate by the end of the week, and that it will pass the house. If these expectations are realized, the bill is likely to reach a vote in the senate after reaching a vote in the house.

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THE SUGAR STRIKERS

A PITCHED BATTLE WITH THE POLICE AND MILITARY.

Policemen and Haters Specially Injured—Comment of the London Press on Mr. Blaine's Letter on the Hearing Question.

GLASGOW, Jan. 6.—The disturbances caused by the evictions of the railroad strikers from the quarters provided for them by the railroad companies have not subsided, in spite of the presence of the scene of the evictions of large forces of police, backed up by the troops.

Serious rioting was resumed today at Coarbridge, about nine miles from here, on the Monkland canal, the chief center of iron manufacture in Scotland.

The police and troops, who have now been on duty for 48 hours, passed a wearisome night, as the strikers, now driven to desperation, were striking the wildest threats. However, the strikers practically abstained from violence through the night, but this morning they mustered at an early hour for the demolition of the strikers' huts.

Chattel mortgages amounting to \$30,000, covering the entire property of the Penular Furniture Company, were executed and filed at 8:45 by the Fourth National Bank for \$4,000. Others followed, and before 10 o'clock six mortgages were placed on record.

The Old National bank filed one for \$3,300, and B. Knowlton one for \$7,123.92, and the Houseman one for \$2,100 and William Green two for \$13,110.93.

The mortgages are concurrent and cover besides the Penular Furniture Company, the stores of William R. Compston, Klughman & Limpert, and W. W. Fugate. The company was organized several years ago with a cash capital of \$10,000.
