EDITOR MORNING PRESS—As some of my Grand Rapids friends have requested me to write, I have been thinking for some time about the best way to connect our papers with the first, and let you compare with the weather there. Today, January 13th, mercury stands at 68 degrees in the shade, and we are having what we would call a "fair" day. It is not so hot as a thunder and lightning, this is what they call winter here, or the rainy season which would probably last about one month yet. Some ardent has been made already, but not much will be done in the rains as yet.
