

DEADLY TO BE CONVINCED

AN INDIRECT VOTE TAKEN IN THE HOUSE.

The Silver Men Will Not Concede Absolute Defeat, but They Certainly Have Received a Heavy Set-Back.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Free coinage got its death blow when the house went into committee of the whole on the sundry civil bill this morning. The first question was Mr. Dingley's point of order raised yesterday on the Bland free coinage amendment to the coinage section of the measure.

While the chairman was reading his decision every seat was filled up. It was known that an appeal was to be taken and that the vote on that appeal would be taken in the afternoon.

Mr. Bland formally appealed from the decision the chairman decided that debate was in order and a discussion was held which bid fair to consume the remainder of the day.

Finally put to a vote and the ruling of the chair was sustained by a vote of 195 yeas, 184 nays, 127 Speaker Reed was sustained in the chair.

Alderman Mills, with tremulous emotion, championed the cause of the policeman "who were liable to be shot down by their tracks."
