**A LONG LIFE.**  
Very few people live a hundred years these days but Grand Rapids and vicinity can point to several instances of people who have attained beyond that age. Robert Roberts being the latest instance.

People who attain that wonderful age are objects of profound admiration and veneration. They "have come down to us as a former generation of men and women deeply charged with recollections of people and events that are pleased to relate and which are listened to with more interest than if read in the formal record of the historian."

The great things which our country in its primitive history and the hands that toiled to change the continent from an Indian hunting ground to the home of culture and the favored realm of science are to this generation objects of fond devotion and love.

How much we all regret the passing away of these venerable relics of "the brave days of old." How much we wish they had lived on to impart to the perfection of human wisdom in science attained and the height of discovery reached through man's matchless energy and courage.
