

WELL THE SURRENDER?

GENERAL SHERMAN FIGHTING AGAINST OHM DEATH.

Owing to Old Age the Enemy Holds Him at a Disadvantage and the Prospects Point to his Defeat.

New York, Feb. 11.—Gen. Sherman was very low this morning. His condition has not changed for the better since last night. If he lives to-day, the crisis will be passed.

New York, Feb. 11.—11 o'clock.—Senator Sherman assumed charge of the general's household. Dr. Alexander stated that the patient was almost in a state of coma, although he rallied occasionally.

Shortly before noon Dr. Alexander looked very gloomy when he was asked for the latest news of the sick general.

"The general passed the worst night he has had since he was taken ill," said the doctor, "and it is not too much to say that his condition this morning is extremely critical. He is very much weaker than he was yesterday morning, and he is not so much as he was yesterday morning."

"The worst feature of the case is that he is in a state of coma, and can only be roused when food is administered. The only thing that has been given him for the last few days has been whisky and milk, and at times he has been delirious, especially during the last twenty-four hours. He does not seem to suffer much pain, and in this weakness and gradual sinking."

All of General Sherman's immediate family, with the exception of Mrs. Sherman, who is a student in the Jesuit theological seminary in the city of New York, are in the city. General Sherman's brother, who came on from Washington yesterday, remained in the city until 11 o'clock, when he went to Colgate Hall for the night.

New York, Feb. 11.—2:30 p.m.—At this hour it is stated that there is no change in General Sherman's condition. He is still in a state of coma, and only arouses when spoken to.

PARNELL'S LATEST

All Negotiations for a Settlement of the Irish Differences Declared Off.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Parnell has declared off all negotiations for the settlement of the differences between the Irish factions, and the whole situation is again at loose ends. The announcement is made by the Independent party, writes Mr. Gill in his article. "As John E. Redmond, M. MORE RECIPROCITY.

BLAINE SAID TO HAVE MADE A DEAL WITH VENEZUELA.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—It is understood that the president has ready for announcement a proclamation of reciprocity with Venezuela, similar in terms to the agreement just reached with Brazil.
