NEW PLACES WITH FAT SALARIES PROPOSED. The Prisoner Features Bill Now Another Kick—It is "Played Horse" With Peter But He Carried It To Post.

LANSING, April 10.—Friday was a most appropriate day for the consideration of Representative Hartz's hanging bill which was a special order for this morning. Representative Hartz did not raise the question of opportunity. The consideration of the bill was once more postponed.

The committee on public health reported the substitute for the Ferguson bill. It contains relative to the appointment of a state medical examining board. The substitute provides for an examining board of nine—three regulars, three homeopaths, two eclectics and one physician recommended by different state medical societies. The bill is reported by the governor. Every person desiring to practice medicine in this state must pass a creditable examination before this board, eight of the board agreeing before the candidate is admitted to practice. The judiciary committee recommended the passage of the substitute bill for the relief of the Supreme court. The salary of the state reporter is raised from \$1,500 to \$2,000 per year. An additional clerk hire is made for each additional clerk hire as soon from time to time may need.

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RECIPROCITY.

The Canadian Envoy Pleas With the Visit to Washington. NEW YORK, April 10.—An Ottawa special says: In the early morning hours Sir J. Thompson and Hon. Geo. B. Foster reached here from Washington. Their first utterances were complimentary of both President Harrison and Secretary Blaine. The two Canadian ministers have fulfilled the government's election campaign pledge regarding a visit to the American capital, and they can assure parliament that the delay in negotiating a reciprocity treaty with the United States government. There was a full attendance at yesterday afternoon's cabinet meeting. The Washington delegation submitted the result of Monday's conference with Secretary Blaine. Both are confident that the Republican administration will meet Canada halfway in the prospective negotiations for the settlement of trade and Atlantic fishery questions. THE PEOPLES COLUMN.

From a Traveller's Sketch. **Envy's Moxie.** If Mr. R. G. found the world "awful" in my article, he did what I fail to do, though there is one that might reasonably be supposed to mean that; and if the two words were really joined together in the copy it was unintentional, but I do not think they were.
If, as he says, "The word of God" is its own interpreter and a very clear one if we will follow its directions, either the directions cannot be very clear, or its interpreters greatly wanting in the ability to understand, as their different conclusions plainly show. He also says, "It is a law of Divine Providence that we may rest in the apparent truth, and we are able to receive the real truth. And it is also provided that we shall remain in partial truth as long as we are unable to bear the full blaze of Divine truth, and I would like to see the man who has got beyond or above that state. But there is a promise that he will destroy the face of the covering that is cast over all people and the veil that is spread over all nations, and we believe that work is now progressing."
If no man has as yet been able to receive only partial truths, then what of our theologians who so confidently assert just what is meant, who speak with the most positive and authoritative tones, and against which many have rebelled at the cost of life and liberty?
If the text quoted is an apparent truth, then hundreds of others may be, and we should decide whether the veil and what the apparent? Have not all an equal right in this matter? The Garden of Eden story, upon which is based the whole Christian doctrine, many of us who believe to be allegorical, and as such, a mere restriction to the intellect, a fact not in accordance with reason, too inconsistent to be accepted by the intellectual faculties.

LEGENDARY WORLDS.

Expeditors Set Out from the Canary Islands to Discover Them.

Stories of legendary worlds have at all times possessed a fascination for most minds and formed the subject of much curious speculation. However childish such tales may seem at the present day, "they once yielded sufficient sway," says M. Flammarin in his "History of the Heavens," "over men's minds as to gain their belief in the veritable existence of the places described, and in this way to influence their astronomical and cosmographical ideas."
Many such legends originated when geography was in its infancy and the greater part of the world's surface still unknown. From that time, too, travellers like Sir John Mandeville excited curiosity by relating discoveries which they professed to have made in their distant journeying, and which those who received them readily accepted as facts.
In process of time these mythical accounts were gradually circulated from one country to another and became interwoven with the traditions of the people among whom they were told. Hence, in one form or another, we find in most parts of the world numerous stories of legendary worlds still current, survivals of which may be traced to the literature of modern times. Thus, going back to early days, the poets and philosophers of Greece and Rome gave detailed accounts of the land whither winds would blow when they were in life is over, enumerating its rivers, its lakes, its woods and mountains.
Accordingly, Ulysses was said to reach the place of the dead by crossing the ocean to the Cimmerian land, Æneas to have entered it by the Lake Avernus, whose Xenophanes informs that Hercules went there by the peninsula of Arechusaide. In early times the Canary Islands were regarded as the neighborhood of the terrestrial home of the blessed dead, and many wonderful stories were told of this enchanted locality.

How He Built Ten Stories.

Capt. E. H. Welch, of Kansas City, said: The ten story building of the western city is what somebody in the town must erect. The somebody is ordinarily a wrecker. He knows when he begins the scheme that he will never live to enjoy the income of the structure, or be a victim of its collapse. He just wants to have it built, he built the ten story affair and he is ready to quit. I know a ten story affair that was built on the following pattern:
The man had \$5,000 cash. He leased a corner in a block and put in his foundation. Then he mortgaged it for \$20,000. That was to cover the foundation and three stories. Then he put on a second mortgage of \$35,000, and with that the structure was run up three stories higher. Then he placed a third mortgage on the building, which put it under roof. He finished it off and rented every office, and every tenant found himself confronted with a garnish by the mechanics who had liens.
These mechanics collected the rents of that building until a rich woman came along and bought the whole edifice, including the lease. But the ambitious fellow who had run up the sky scraper had his name on a stone over the entrance, and he seemed to be happy. There is a good deal of that sort of thing going on in the country.—Chicago Tribune.

Electric Lights on Street Cars.

Some interesting experiments were made recently in Bradford, England, on the lighting of street cars by electricity. A car was illuminated by three incandescent lamps of five candle power each. They were fed from three storage batteries placed beneath the seats, capable of supplying current continuously for six hours. The light obtained is described as being about equivalent to that given under the best conditions by the oil lamps at present in use, with, of course, the additional advantages of absence of smell and necessity for trimming.—New York Telegram.

But a king of Portugal is said to have made a condition for the discovery of it to another when it should be discovered, and when the kingdom of Portugal ceded to the Castilian crown the rights over the Canaries that treaty included the island of Brandan, described as the island which had not yet been found.—London Standard.
