NO DEMAND FOR LEGISLATIVE TINKERING.

The Illuminating Oil Bill Passed and Pulled Back—Senator Sherman's Resolving Act. Defeated by the Lobby.

LANSING, April 24.—In reply to a resolution of the House asking for information on the subject of the mortgage Bank Commissioner Sherwood sent the following communication to that body this morning: "I am unable to give separate the amount loaned on farm and business property, the two being combined in reports made into this department, but from examinations made during the past year my opinion is that a large portion of money loaned by the state banks to mortgage property is loaned on farms and houses of laboring men, and that a very small proportion is loaned on business property, as those loans are usually taken by insurance companies or State banks at a lower rate of interest than Western State banks, viz: 5% per cent, which is the average rate of interest charged by our state banks. The commercial loans are not made to business men. Banks in our farmy districts loan more readily to farmers than they do to business men, and without mortgage security."
