FORGETS HIS CRIME

Convict Duquette Asks Pardon for Assault on Friends at New Year.

Four Years' Penitence. Lacking Republican: Michigan's press has been weeping for the past week in sympathy with one Joseph Duquette.

Joseph Duquette, a convict who has been an inmate of the state prison since 1877, has just written Governor Winans a letter, a most pathetic letter, for pardon. It gives evidence of great mental suffering for the last two years. It is lamentable, and more so when it is recalled that Duquette and Joseph has secured to himself the sympathy and commendation of the state's citizens, who, on the strength of that aid letter would sign his petition.

To punish a human being is a sorrow to the generous, sympathetic spirit of the free American citizen, and the universal sentiment seems to be that Joseph has done nothing wrong, inasmuch as he has been the victim of a most horrible crime—a very commendable sentiment, indeed, on reading the convict's letter for pardon with reference to a murder committed in 1863.

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But before allowing thirty-four years in prison. The letter is so full of pathos and sympathy that it is almost impossible to believe that the man who committed such a crime could be capable of such a letter.

THE MINER BILL.

The Miner bill for the election of presidential electors by congressional districts in Michigan will surely become a law, and we do not see the example of other states adopted in every state in the union.

It would bring the presidential election nearer the people, just as it does the election of representatives in congress by districts instead of by states on a general ticket.

The election of senators in congress by the legislatures of the states to give them a sort of ambassadorial character at Washington is growing in disfavor with the people. There is a strong feeling throughout the nation in favor of electing senators by a direct vote of the people, and this same feeling is extending to the choice of president.

If congress would declare in favor of the election of representatives in congress by the vote of the whole state, thus doing away with districts and gerrymanders, it would find how strongly the people prefer the district system to the present one.

We have no interest in any party, private or to come to influence our opinion in this matter. We believe the bill is right and in compliance with the popular demand for the exercise of power as directly as possible by the people.

A PUBLIC DISPLAY.

The Michigan has so little to do and is far ahead of the expectations of the people as to the time of adjournment that the house concluded to devote a day to discussing reciprocity with Canada.

The Democrats really meant to endorse reciprocity, but did not want to use that word in their resolutions, for fear it would be taken in the sense of Blaine's reciprocity which has become a Republican epithet.

Mr. Dickema discovered this aversion of the Democrats and moved an amendment that gave the resolutions the missing Blaine trade mark. At first the Democrats agreed to it, then they changed their minds and backed out and finally they got the resolution through in shape to suit them with Blaineism expunged.

The whole affair on both the Democratic and Republican side was childish and ridiculous. If the subject had been taken up at all it would have made no difference to reciprocity either in Blaine's sense or the Democratic sense and time that cost the state \$500 would not have been wasted.

Such a puppet display by weak men in office is not to be regretted because of the individual silliness it exhibits, but, as it has a tendency to beam the people by low estimates of their intelligence and partisan spirit, its occurrence is a public disgrace.

It is not at all likely that either party will go outside of this city for a congressional candidate. This will not only be the order this year, but next and for many years to come, unless perhaps there should arise a man of extraordinary talents in one of the outside counties. Senators and governors, and possibly electors, may be chosen from outside this city, but congressmen never, unless compelled by factional fights or the extraordinary merits of a rivalist.

Butt Harte once wrote a few lines in which he declared that "for ways that are dark and tricks that are vain the Heavens Chinese is peculiar." The Chinese emperor is hereby informed that every American with intelligence enough to be a minister in China has regarded those lines, so slanderous of the Chinese, with hilarious approval. Are we all in the soup with Blaine? Can one of us be a minister to China?

The next congressman from this district will have to be pledged to the free and unlimited coinage of silver, the free and unlimited use of the volume of paper money by a further issue of full legal tender treasury notes. He will have to be pledged to a graded income tax and to a law that will carefully guard our country from the vices, crimes and pauperism that attend unconditional and unrestrained immigration.

THERE is nothing in all this talk of Alger for a cabinet place or the presidency, and Tom Palmer knows it better than any other man in Michigan—we were going to say better than any other man in the United States, but when we thought of Ben Harrison and Sherman, we dropped to Michigan as aforesaid.

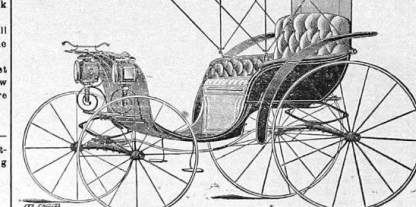

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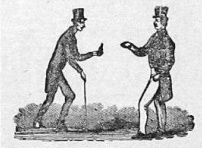

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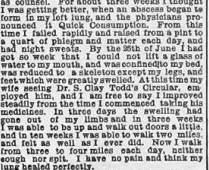
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
