The Socialists were very warm under the collar last night when it became known that the street car strike had called for police protection. 'That's the way striking workmen are treated on the other side,' said one of the Workingmen's club; 'the company should remember that police interference caused the Haymarket tragedy in Chicago.'

No More Silver Dollars Jackson Patriot: The collapse of silver dollars, under the act passed by the last congress, approved July 14, 1890, will cause the silver dollar to be a thing of the past.

The secretary of the treasury, in a circular just issued, gives this as a reason for refusing to furnish them to the public hereafter, 'otherwise than in redemption of silver certificates or treasury notes,' but offers to forward silver half dollars, quarter-dollars, or dimes, to any address, free of cost for transportation by express, in sums of \$200 and over, or in registered mail in packages of \$70, in exchange for any kind of money deposited for that purpose.

This is the scheme that has been adopted to unload the \$21,000,000 of fractional coin now held by the United States treasury, and so to get rid of the national bankruptcy as long as possible.

But it is not a striking circumstance that under the latest silver law of the late Republican congress, the collapse of silver dollars will cease in a few weeks, and for the reason that the government will furnish the public any more of them, otherwise than for the redemption of silver certificates or treasury notes.

The government will keep on buying and piling up 4,500,000 ounces of silver, each, but will coin no more dollars. The conspiracy of the late Republican congress against silver dollars, under the law framed by Senator Sherman, is being exhibited, in less than a year after its enactment.

No more silver dollars for the people. It is a pity that the purchase and storage of silver bullion for the benefit of the mine owners is a commodity than ever.

Waterloo Street Disgrace. The record at police headquarters for Saturday night shows that 111 of the Waterloo Street houses are called by Morrison's name at 190 South Waterloo street to quiet a disturbance between a lot of gentlemen visitors. The Morrison house and other houses in the neighborhood, have been the scene of many a row of late, and yet, the police do not know of a respectable house in the city, or at least no attention is paid to the credit orders of the council to suppress them.

growing in Pennsylvania. Colonel H. C. Demming, state secretary of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Alliance, says that the order, although only one year old, already outnumbered all previous organizations of farmers in the state. 'We now have some 300 organizations, with an average membership of 100. As the present rate of increase this is July will be about 500,000 members and 1,000 societies. AN INSTRUCTIVE DOCUMENT.

The Alliance Legislators of Minnesota Say How They Were Handcuffed.

The following manifesto has been drawn up and signed by the Farmers' Alliance members of the Minnesota legislature. It furnishes complete answers to the attacks of the monopolistic press, which is making such ado over the fact that 'the hayseed legislators didn't do anything after all their shouting.'

The undersigned, representatives and senators, elected to the recent legislature to endorse the Alliance principle, perceiving that a concerted attempt is being made to make the Farmers' Alliance responsible for the extravagance and failure of the session, just closed, respectfully state:

First—That there were but forty-six Alliance senators and members in the legislature out of 103. That this number being considerably less than one-third of the whole cannot be held responsible for the course of the legislature in any particular, and cannot be held responsible for any legislative act.

Second—An examination of the record will show that nearly every legislative act of the Alliance members and senators voted on the side of retrenchment, reform and good government.

Third—The failure to accomplish the work demanded by the people because they could not get support enough from a number of the old parties.

And—A large part of the great increase in the appropriations complained of has been due to the standards of our public and charitable institutions. The vanity of localities and of officials has resulted in the 'home-made' character of the appropriations, and the management of the Republican party the Alliance will be held responsible for their extravagance.

The Alliance has applied the pruning knife vigorously, but with such results that it is possible we have not been able to keep the appropriations within reasonable limits. We were opposed to the appropriation bills and the bill increasing the tax on the liquor.
