CABLE CAR DRIVERS MOBBED LAST NIGHT.

The Cable Broken on East Fulton Street—Three or Four Men Intervened—Company Arriving the Scene.

There was a rumor yesterday on the street that a number of men had gathered about the employ of the company. The number of men thus reported by some was placed at 10 and others put the figure at 17, but at the call of the union men at the last session yesterday afternoon, every member of the union was accounted for except three. A new member by the name of Kennedy was reported as having signified his intention of renouncing his membership in the union.

It is a rumor that the cable car was destroyed by the explosion of a bomb. He is a young man with family and support and no one depending on him but he would not state on what terms he returned, yet he intimated that the company had held out a great inducement for him to go to work. Mr. Hunter and B. Morris, two others who struck, were not accounted for, and it was learned they had returned to the employ of the company. Hunter never paid his dues to the union, and Morris was taken by the company on the 17th, only a short time before the strike, but he had paid two months' dues. These men, no doubt, are the ones referred to by the ten men in a line article published in the Herald on the 17th.
