Fun with 'Jack' Hayward as President of the Reform Legislature

LAUNDRY, May 27.—There will undoubtedly be a general revision of the state constitution in 1893.

The committee on judicial affairs has recommended that Representative Swift's bill relative to the bonds of retail liquor dealers, declaring them insufficient in certain cases, and when and how new bonds may be required.

The committee on military affairs has reported favorably on Senator Benson's bill providing for the payment of the arrears of bounty to soldiers.

Gov. Winans transmitted to the house this afternoon a report of Railroad Commissioner Whitman, in which the official record of the railroad companies is set out in detail.

The bill appropriating \$250,000 for the Normal school was amended for passage. The consideration of the bill was made a special order for Friday morning.

Senator Wicker's bill to create a board of directors for the Michigan Normal school was considered during the remainder of the morning session.
