

STRIKES AND STRIKERS

THE LONDON OMNIBUS LINES COMPLETELY TIED UP.

The New York Lumber Dealers' Boycott—Detroit strikers—Yesterday's developments in the London Omnibus lines.

LONDON, June 8.—Hardly a single omnibus of the 875 vehicles belonging to the London Omnibus Company is running today, and it is estimated that about 5,000 men, and 10,000 horses are thrown into a state of idleness through the strike which commenced yesterday.

The amount of inconvenience to which the workmen are subjected may be readily imagined when it is understood that tens of thousands of people depend upon the omnibuses to convey them to their work.

All the yards of the General Omnibus Company are strongly picketed by the men on strike and the usually swarming business main streets of the metropolis present a deserted and forlorn appearance.
