

THE HONORABLE THURMAN CAMPBELL

GOVERNOR CAMPBELL RENOMINATED BY ACCLAMATION.

The Cincinnati Disasters Overwhelmingly Outvoted at Every Point by the Republican Temporary Chairman

CLEVELAND, July 15.—One of the largest and at the same time most laborious convocations ever assembled in the history of Ohio Democracy met in this city at 10:30 this morning. The renomination of Governor Campbell had been conceded by his opponents since last night, but the sturdy determination to refuse, after the formal result should be ascertained, the time-honored courtesy of a unanimous nomination, wrought dismay in the hearts of all who declared that upon a united and harmonious Democracy rested the only hope of victory in the coming campaign.

The vast music hall in which the convention was held was packed to its utmost capacity. The delegates, many of whom had arrived from distant points, were seated in the galleries and on the floor, and gave to the interior of the vast hall all the colors of the rainbow.

Promptly at 10:30 Chairman Norton of the state central committee called the convention to order, and the Rev. J. W. Campbell, of Cleveland, invoked the benediction of our Heavenly Father.

The Thurnan Quarrelsome Club of Columbus sang "The Welcome Meeting," after which Chairman Norton of the state central committee formally opened the convention by reading the report of the executive committee.

Chairman Norton then introduced his son, Allen W. Thurman, as temporary chairman. As Mr. Thurman stepped modestly forward the vast audience burst into cheers at the sight of the Ohio's distinguished leader. He made a telling speech.

The committee on permanent organization reported that ex-Congressman Frank LeBlond of Mercer county had been elected permanent secretary of the convention. The announcement was received with great applause, and a committee was appointed to confer with the chair, Chairman LeBlond's speech was brief and to the point.

The report of the committee on resolutions was presented and adopted, and Chairman Felt of the committee on resolutions reported that the committee had adopted the following resolutions: That the Republican party, through its platform, has failed to give the people the protection and security which they are entitled to.

Dryness's Plans to be Tested in Texas.

ROME, N. Y., July 15.—For the last few days General R. C. Drenforth, of the United States army, has been testing the plans of Professor Carl E. Meyer, of Frankfort, Kentucky, in consultation with the noted balloonist, Professor Meyer has invented an apparatus which he can regulate the fall of a balloon by means of a small explosive bomb, the explosion of which will produce a fall in the most rapid manner.

The plan is to inflate the balloons with one part of oxygen and two parts of hydrogen. A small ordinary cartridge connected with two wires is placed in the balloon, and when the wires are cut the balloon is sufficiently high the cartridge is exploded by means of electricity, and the balloon falls to the ground.

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
