A Christiana reporter's view of the subject of Imported Pauper. The following is taken from one of the columns of Rev. Louis A. Banks, of Boston, who after an examination of the sweating system have caused such general interest. I have no sympathy with those people who are crying out against all foreigners; yet it seems to me that no serious student of the signs of the times can take other than a sober view of this overwhelming tide of foreign immigration which has come to this country.
