MUNICIPAL MATTERS

A LIVELY SESSION OF THE COUNCIL LAST NIGHT.

Mayor Eli presented at the meeting of the common council last night with eighteen aldermen present...

The Kent County Agricultural society extended an invitation to the city officers to attend the fair in a body which was accepted by a unanimous vote.

Alderman Tatum secured the floor for Thomas D. Gilbert, who read a long communication setting forth his ideas as to how the city should be lighted.

L. L. Lanier, sealer of weights and measures, reported that the Consolidated Street Railway company had received from the city ordinances regarding scales, and the report was referred to the city attorney with power to report.

A lively tilt occurred over the paving of North Main street between East Park and Monroe. Alderman Tatum wanted it paved with brick and Alderman Conger wanted asphalt.

The committee on ordinances reported favorably on the proposition to make the city street of East Fulton street a market street.

The mayor was authorized to execute the contract for paving South Grand street with asphalt.

The ordinance regarding the placing of telephones in the city was read and was referred to the city engineer.

THE VOLUNTARY MONEY.

For the use of the Silver Republicans of Ohio, upholding limited silver coinage, the treasury department has specially prepared a table, in which it is made to appear that we now have a large volume of money on hand that we ever had since 1865.

This kind of a showing is made by casting out everything that was money years ago for the war, but not now known in the volume of money. It is deceitful and false and every man who was in business for five years after the war knows it to be such.

This same dodge was made by the Shermanites at the time the greenbacks made their fight in 1876 to 1880 and forced the repeal of the resumption act in 1878 that made resumption possible in 1879.

Contraction had been the policy of McCullough and Sherman, and that policy greenbacks were destroyed until a money crisis was precipitated and then began the agitation for currency and financial reform that culminated in the report of the committee on the Simpson act that retired legal tender notes and authorized the sale of bonds to gain a gold reserve and increase the power of the banks.

They are compelled to deceive and their deception is well known to every intelligent banker. A cause that has to be strengthened by a recourse to such trickery must be innately weak and the trickery that proved a failure in 1878 against Greenbackism will be found a failure in 1891 against free silver and the alliance.

CHICAGO'S LABOR TEMPLE.

It is said a structure to cost \$1,000,000 will be completed in 1892. Several times during the past ten years there has been talk that organized labor in some locality where it was particularly strong would erect a building of its own, to be used for meetings of the various local unions, for employment offices, lodgings, house, etc.

In Chicago the bricklayers' union has its own hall in a building situated on West Monroe street, which, in addition to furnishing a place of meeting for the union, is also a source of considerable income from rents. Now, there is to be erected in that city a labor temple that will furnish meeting rooms and offices for all the unions in the city, and at the same time be a source of income to the organizations that take stock in the enterprise.

It is proposed to make the labor temple ten stories high, with an additional two stories in the central portion of the building. The structure will occupy an area of about 100,000 sq. ft. So far the site has not been chosen. The building will be absolutely fireproof, with hydraulic elevators and steam heat. The central extension will be of stone, brick and terra cotta, the different materials being used to emphasize the architectural proportions.

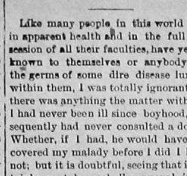
THE MASS CONVENTION.
