McKinley Prices. The Republicans are taunting the Democrats with the statement that the McKinley bill has not increased prices. It was the last year that prices were lower than they are now. The McKinley bill would increase the price of things higher taxed, and indeed quote a few commercial circles were quoted and one especially sent out by Foster, Stoughton & Co., who had a strong partisan favor to prove that the McKinley bill would compel a raise in prices.

In a little while the folly of these elevators became apparent in special advertisements, offering goods at 10c under the McKinley bill as before it became law, and today it is hard for the Democrats to confuse the Republicans by showing that the high taxed articles of the McKinley bill were before McKinley's bill became law. If the thing is possible the Democrats should apply to Sid Stevens for another campaign document showing the higher prices his bill has now brought. But the fact is that prices have not advanced, as the Democrats predicted they would, and that is why the Republicans are happy.

Of course there could not be any raise in prices under the present conditions, as in prior years there should have been under proper conditions. If we had not lost nearly \$100,000,000 in gold since last January, higher import duties would have made higher prices inevitable. The appreciation in money through contraction, caused by gold shipments, increase of population and increase of business makes a general raise in prices impossible. The appreciation in money through depreciation of property more than the McKinley bill appreciated it by increased taxation, and for this reason the Republicans are enabled to hide the real increase of prices imposed by higher import duties.

SILVER ISSUE. The whole bent of the discussion on the stump in Ohio is the silver question. It is only a national question, but it is discussed in all of the great states this fall. In Iowa state prohibition is the turning point of the canvass. In Pennsylvania it is local matters, such as the question of Bartley and Quay. In New York it is Boss Platt on one side and Boss Hill on the other.

It was over this a fool campaign inaugurated by Democrats and Republicans on the one side, and the McKinley Democrats accuse the Republicans of being run by Platt. The Republicans accuse the Democrats of being bossed by Hill and Tammany. It is twofold and twofold about the silver question. The fact is, it is a farce. Millionaire Flower wants to be governor and have his hands full of offices and be covered with the honors of the people north of New York. He wants to set up a chair in the White House at Washington.

Millionaire Fassett wants the same thing that Flower wants. They both agree on the finance question and the difference between them on trusts, monopolies and tariffs is so small that daylight would not show through the crack. But they have to get up a row about something in order to get the money, and so they set up from the stump a lot of slush about Plattism and Hillism. But in Ohio an earnest national issue is joined and the issue is on the silver question, which is a question worthy of the consideration of the people, a question worthy of a patriotic and honest difference, a question that is practical, live and to the point at this time.
