Saloons and Gambling Houses First to Spring Into Existence—A Newspaper Woman Killed in the Wild Race.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Sept. 29.—In a driving rain at Chandler, a volley of musketry fired at noon today was the signal for a mad rush of 3,000 speculators and house-sellers to the capital.

There were less than a thousand left for the 3,000 people and an hour after noon the town was filled with disappointed men and women.

At the same time a number of the dozens of clatta disputes and blood is likely to flow on account of them.
