A dispatch to the New York Sun gives the opinions of Maine horsemen on the result of the great stallion race in this city as follows:

"Hanager the famous mare always claimed that C. H. Nelson lacked the shrewdness and the other qualities which go to make a good driver in such an important race—in short, that although he owns a good horse he is no horseman. To be beaten was had enough, but to be beaten in 2:14 1/2, 2:15, and 2:16 1/2 is humiliating. The result of the race means not only the loss of many thousands of dollars to Maine men who backed their favorite, but the loss of many times as much to the breeders of this state, who have always stood by Nelson and given him generous patronage. It was the judgment of Eastern breeders that Mr. Nelson should have allowed another man to drive his horse, for victory of defeat in this contest means as much comparatively to them as to him. One Knochbreder estimated that he is \$10,000 poorer on account of Nelson's defeat. This same breeder recently wrote a letter to Mr. Nelson berating him not to engage in such a race, arguing that the loss of the gain to his patrons would be nothing as compared with the loss that defeat would bring to the stallion. Nelson's son is a headstrong man, and he went in and met his Waterloo. Many horsemen in Maine are of the opinion that at last had some of the conceit taken out of him."
