GOLD, SILVER AND PAPER.

The Republican speakers all unite in saying they favor a volume of money composed of gold, silver and paper but all of equal value. So far as that goes that is precisely what the People's party mean the same thing as was expressed by Secretaries Manning and Fairchild, under President Cleveland, they don't differ from the Republicans. Manning and Fairchild both proposed that the greenbacks should be retired and destroyed, just as their Republican predecessors time and again had suggested should be done with them. What kind of paper money would have it not to be a dollar? It is the fact that not one of all these long line of Republican and Democratic secretaries of the treasury has ever whispered a word against the national bank note we infer they were all entirely pleased with it.

It is not the treasury note these Republicans and Democrats want for the paper money they speak of in connection with gold and silver, but the note or coin certificate. The people demand and will have the treasury note as also coin certificates and the People's party is the only party that squarely represents that demand. The coin certificate made as good as gold unless the silver dollar is at once enlarged one-fourth, and further enlargements made from time to time as gold through its growing scarcity goes to a value above and after that the value through its increasing production. This cannot be done and the silver dollar is not going to pack around with them pounds of metal coins for postage stamps. There is only one fair and honest way for gold and silver to be made of equal value and have those metals coined to the extent of their production, and that is by free coinage.

When gold is purchased with gold by the government for limited coinage, it will not be on a parity with gold. The government must make it a money metal the same as gold, cease to treat it as an article of commerce and offer to coin it as such. If it is made as gold and then it will be on a parity with gold and its coinage as good as gold, and not before.

All presume that these old parties want money to be of gold, silver and paper, the one as good as the other and especially that they want gold and silver on a parity, are false as long as they offer free silver coinage.

From A to Z in the professions of the old parties are for gold and nothing else, with a few exceptions conduced by the money power. This policy is fatal to the industrial masses but it is favored by the money power, it favors a trust or monopoly in money that is to make the rich richer and the poor poorer and certainly leads to an aristocratic plutocracy that will end in the downfall of the Republic or a bloody revolution such as France experienced in 1789.

A money trust, made possible through a small volume of gold, is the most devilish machine that can be contrived against human freedom. It is the enemy of labor and a people's government. Patriots we appeal to you in city and country, vote against that satanic device by giving your votes to Edward Hutchins, the People's party candidate for governor.

Mr. Capri Holman was so efficient and able when in congress we should like to see him well posted Republican to rise up and explain why he was overlooked last year for a renomination? It may be said he declined. So he did this year, but everybody knows he was just as willing to accept a nomination last year as he was this year. He was never known not to be ready to take office. He was not built that way.

Against the vote of Lawrence stands a Republican senate and president, against the vote of Balknap stand a majority of fifty Democrats in the house of representatives.

If Balknap is elected we know the vote will be against free silver. If Lawrence is elected we do not understand that it is sure what he would do. If Hutchins is elected he would vote and work zealously for free silver and on that question the vote is cast.

But aside from all practical effects of this election the moral effect is with Mr. Hutchins who stands for a new policy that is devoted for the elevation and happiness of the masses. Republican and Democratic policies are well understood and the vote in this district will not boom either policy one little bit. The election of Hutchins would indicate a change in the condition of things and the tendencies of the government.
