

"LUCILLE" WITH HEAD

THE AUTHOR OF "LUCILLE" GONE TO HIS REWARD.

The Grim Messenger met him at Paris where he represented the British Government—Brief Sketch of His Diplomatic Career.

PARIS, Nov. 24.—Right Hon. Edward Robert Bulwer Lytton, earl of Lytton, British Ambassador to France, died suddenly today from heart disease.

The earl of Lytton was the only son of the great novelist, Edwin Bulwer, author of "Eugene Aram" and other famous works. The last earl of Lytton was killed in action at the battle of Waterloo, and afterwards at Bonn, Germany.

He was born November 8, 1811, and educated at Harrow under Sir Robert, and afterwards at Bonn, Germany. He entered the diplomatic service of the English crown at the age of 18. October 12, 1849, he was appointed attaché to the British legation at Paris, and afterwards acting as private secretary to his uncle, Sir Henry Bulwer, who was British ambassador to France in 1852. He was transferred as attaché to Florence, and on August 18, 1853, he was sent to Paris.

His fame would have been wider if he had not been so plain looking. From 1858 to 1860 he was acting secretary to the British legation at Vienna, but he was recalled to London in 1860. But for one drawback her career and fame would have been wider. She was very plain, and she lacked distinction, her appearance in later years having been that of a good, plain woman. She was doing her own housework, and there is a story extant as to how an impetuous one called and surprised her in her dressing room with intent to force a marriage upon her.
