THE FRESH START.

THE SUPERVISORS RESCIND THE VAULT FIXTURE CONTRACT.

The Action Unanimous—The Matter of a Sewer Contract Laid on the Table Until Today—One Bid for the Old Property—The Jail to be Repaired.

As was anticipated the action of the board of supervisors ordering the execution of the contract with the Fenton company for court house fixtures was rescinded at yesterday morning's session.

The matter was brought up by a communication from the Hoffman Law company, retelling the contract mentioned in yesterday's issue, repeating their offer to furnish the fixtures for \$800 less than the Fenton company's bid, and asking that the job be re-advertised.

Supervisor Loomis at once took the floor and urged the board to rescind all action relative to the matter and to take a fresh start with a clean slate.

The board was informed by the prosecuting attorney that the county was not legally compelled to carry out the contract if the board had been misled or deceived.

Supervisor Gould rather talked against such a course fearing that it would injure the county in expensive litigation.

The matter was temporarily laid upon the table but later was brought up again by the county clerk who moved the adoption of the following:

Whereas, information has come to this board that the firms who submitted proposals for furnishing vault fixtures for the court house entered into an agreement for the purpose of misleading the board and obtaining an excessive price therefor; therefore

Resolved, That all action taken by this board in accepting the proposals for the fixtures for the court house and the clerk to sign any contract for the same, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Mr. Loomis moved the appointment of a committee to inquire into the matter and to report to the board on or before the 27th inst.

The court house building committee reported at length upon how things stand. Up to date \$143,006.27 has been paid on contracts, and \$16,778.56 for expenses incurred by the board.

The committee on public buildings reported at length upon the matter of the sidewalk and copings contract which was awarded to A. Hirtz & Son at \$125,000.

The contract with the prosecuting attorney at \$150 a month for his legal services was ordered rescinded.

The committee on public buildings reported at length upon the matter of the jail and recommended re-arranging the boiler and grates so as to give a better draught and a better consumption of fuel.

The committee on public buildings reported at length upon the matter of the men's ward in a manner similar to that of the men's ward. The former charge was \$75,000 and the latter \$87,000.
