Alger Wanted to Find Out if the Secretary
Was a Candidate or Not, but Failed to

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Mr. Blaine is having a good laugh among his friends at the expense of General Alger, Chairman of the Republican National committee, and another leading light of the Republican party.
