ONE OF THE OCEAN GRABBERS FIGHT ON SANDY HOOK.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—The Inman line steamer City of Berlin ran against this side of Sandy Hook shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon. It is expected she can be got off at high tide. Tugs have been sent to her assistance. The steamer grounded at Sandy Hook, but north of Gettys' buoy. The tide was out at the time and a strong off-shore wind blowing out to sea made the water very shallow. The huge steamer worked her propeller for half an hour but could not get off. The tug tug tug tug tug tug and three tugs went to her assistance. The City of Berlin registers 400 tons. She is 110 feet long, about twenty cabin and 300 stowage passengers are aboard.

TALKING FOR FUN.

The Canadian Rectify Commissioners Have No Authority to Make a Treaty for Their Government. WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The Canadian rectify commissioners, accompanied by Secretaries Blaine and Ekins and Sir Julian Pauncefote, called at the State department this morning and presented to the president. They were at Secretary Blaine's house at 11 o'clock and their call lasted about half an hour. The visit was merely for the purpose of paying respects and there was no discussion of an essential question under consideration.

At the close of yesterday's meeting at the state department it was decided to hold the next session Monday, when the negotiations will be continued. There is no chance of ascertaining at present how much longer the conference will be continued. It is understood that Secretary Blaine has elicited the fact that the commission from Canada have no real authority to conclude any reciprocal trade arrangement at present, and that on the basis of a further prolongation of the discussion no real business can be done. It is further understood that Sir Julian Pauncefote, in reply to the queries put to him by the commissioners, has the absence of any final negotiating power on the part of the present commission, but that the government of Canada would favor any request within the bounds of reason that the commission should be authorized to conclude a treaty.

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ALLEGED COMBINE TO FORCE UP THE PRICE OF COTTON.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Rumors are current in the cotton exchange that a combine has been formed for the purpose of advancing the price of cotton. For a long time the market has been depressed and remarkably low prices have been ruling. It is generally admitted that the price of cotton leaves a small margin of profit to both producer and dealer. Some assert that the price is really being forced down by the combine.

HOTEL ROYAL FIRE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Pira Marshall, who had been arrested on suspicion of being connected with the fire at the Hotel Royal, which resulted in the death of seven persons. He says the fire started in the elevator shaft, and that the fire probably caused by the hands of Engineer Hardie, which set fire to gas leaking from the gas hose which furnished light for the elevator.
