THE BLUE AND THE GRAY CLASH HANDS IN FRIENDSHIP. A Strong Document Presented—Free Silver Cause Demanded and Increased Circulation—The Land Loan and Sub-Treasury Plan Mildly Endorsed.

St. Louis, Feb. 24.—Save for the members of the committees on anti-union and platform, all of the delegates and over a thousand of the general public were in their seats at 9 o'clock when President Polk resumed control of the gavel.

When the patriotic proceedings were inaugurated by Ben Terrell of Texas, who was loudly cheered as he came forward with the big banner bearing, he said that he was not ashamed of the fact that he was one of the men who wore the gray.

We, the representatives of the blue and the gray, believe that the day has come to bury in one common tomb the wrongs, malice and hatred resulting from the war, and united under one flag and citizens of one grand nation we gladly join hands to emancipate the home we cherish from the tyrannical oppression of the money power.

When the enthusiasm that this resolution evoked had in a measure subsided, Vandervoort made an earnest address in its support. He said that the day had come when the veterans of the blue should stand on one common platform for the benefit of the people and to restore peace, prosperity and harmony.

As one who had faced them on the field of battle, he had always been willing to stand up to the veterans of the gray, and had been accomplished. They had joined together in defense of the rights of the people—the blue and the gray united under the same flag, and that would come forth from this convention. God speed the movement, and he would go on to the front.

The platform and address submitted by the committee is summarized as follows: This, the first great labor conference of the United States, organized by rural organized industry, assembled in the hall of the nation has declared its actions the blessing and protection of Almighty God, past, present and to come.

If you cannot break the ten strands, and if they do not discolor the fingers at the point of contact, you may at once be sure that you have pure silk, that is, honest in its make and durable in the wear.—Detroit Free Press.
