He Attributes Low Prices for Farm Products to Manipulation by Speculators. C. Wood Davis Before the House Committee on Agriculture.

During a recent session of the house of representatives committee on agriculture, the subject of option gambling was under consideration.

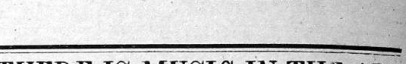
