

THE PEOPLE ARMING AGAINST THEIR SOVEREIGN.

Many Arrests are Made by the Imperial Soldiers—Accompanied on Their Way to Prison, by Friends Who Cheer the Prisoners—Military in Readiness.

ATHENS, March 5.—Great excitement reigns and rumors of an approaching revolution are heard everywhere. It is said that people in the interior are arming themselves in the principal streets and are engaged in crowds discussing the situation. Every member of the bourgeoisie in public became the center of a throng of inquirers. Loud utterances were heard condemning King George for what is called his usurpation, and the partitions of Macedonia were held to be a fate to denounce the king as an usurper who is endeavoring to follow in the footsteps of his brother-in-law, the czar, and to substitute Russian rule for the constitutional government of Greece. At a public meeting the deposed premier, M. Deligianis, has been arrested, while the ex-minister, M. Gounaris, has been released. This, however, has had no effect in quelling the popular excitement. It is said that as many as 10,000 men have been armed and are ready to follow the king and his army. The king has ordered that the military and naval forces be kept in readiness for possible trouble, and it is said that he had a long consultation yesterday with the representatives of Great Britain and Russia.
