WRITTEN BY THE CITY TO LABOR. In the Democratic city convention resolutions the following occur:

The administration has uniformly refused to allow the machinery of the city to be used to oppress labor, and in its complications where labor was involved has insisted, so far as the city government was authorized to act, that the law should be upheld and the rights of both employer and employee respected and enforced with strict impartiality.

It is a fact, however, that the police force was used to arrest men in their beds at midnight for crimes charged against them that could not be proved; men, too, who stood high as useful, honorable citizens, the only cause of suspicion against them being the fact that they occupied leading places in labor organizations.

It is confessed on all hands that these arrests were outrageous and unnecessary. No man of wealth would have been subjected to any such indignity without a great necessity existing for it. But a Democratic fire and police board continues in office the police officers who planned these cowardly and shameful arrests.

Then again it will be remembered that the police professed to know all about the plan to destroy the wheel of the cable street railway at Sweet street and instead of going there to guard it and wear the conspirators away, a large detail of the force went there armed to await in ambush the misguided men who were led there by "scouts" and to shoot them down in cold blood.

The Morning Press has no sympathy with such a lawless act as was contemplated against that wheel by the workmen and it was right that the property should be protected, but it was not necessary that the plans for its protection should have been laid so murderously as they were.

It was a time of high excitement, wild and foolish things were done, but the violators of law were not chronic criminals, they were men who were devoted to honest industry and really constituted the best element of this city's population. Two policemen on guard would have been sufficient to protect that wheel without the firing of a shot.

There was no need to levy a disorganized mass of unarmed, foolish workmen into an ambush where their lives were to be put in peril by a larger force of armed policemen and their wives widowed, their children orphaned and their homes left desolate for the prey of vice and crime.

And yet police officers who planned that murderous affair and executed it by the aid of "spies" and "scouts," who led the rabble into the trap set for them, and who encouraged the devilish scheme are retained in office by a Democratic board of fire and police.

Instead of permitting that attack on the wheel the police force should have prevented it and saved the city the disgrace of that lawless act and saved the workmen from the folly and sin of such attempts to uphold the strikers.

In these instances the machinery of the city government was hastily conscripted to the service of the street railway in a manner that did oppress labor without any need of it in the cause of law and order, a cause that THE MORNING PRESS recognizes as far above the interests of individuals, classes or monopolies.

The Democrats should not stand and lament the possibility of Republican victory through the organization of the People's party. If they cannot win themselves they can make Republican defeat certain by voting the People's party ticket. Next fall the situation may be different and they may then sorely regret Republican success, which they now can prevent by giving their preference for the People's party.

The Democratic nominee for mayor is a manufacturer and capitalist. The Republican nominee is an office-seeking lawyer. The People's party nominee is an inventor, mechanical expert and patent right solicitor. He is a hard worker in his way at the bench, the drafting table and the desk. He occupies the highest rank of the workmen attain and remain workmen.

Thus talk about the city hall gang by the Republicans is the silliest kind of demagoguism. It is simply the cry of one gang against another. Mr. Stuart is no respect a better man than Mr. Shanahan.
