THE MISSISSIPPI RESERVATION THROWN OPEN AT LAST.

A Beggar Opens the Signal at Noon and Soon Only a Cloud of Alkali Dust Shows Where the Army of Homeless Disappeared.

LINCOLN, S. D., April 15.—At five minutes to noon today a crowd of fifty with a long yellow plume streaming from his helmet and a brand new bugle suspended from his shoulder by a bright yellow cord, rode to the crest of the hills which separates Brown's Valley from the Mission reservation.

Scattered along in an uneven line to the north and south of him were three companies of cavalry, each man fully armed with saber, revolver and carbine. Behind them were mounted on horseback, a heterogeneous mass of men—white, yellow and black—all nationalists of the Caucasian race, with a liberal mixture of half-breeds and negroes.

As all nationalities and races of men were represented, so were the animals of all kinds and colors. A splendid Kentucky thoroughbred which showed his bluegrass ancestry in the small dark muzzle and nostrils, a pair of fine limbs, carried a man who had thrown aside everything which could impede his ride and was leaning forward.

At the first note there was a crack from the carbine of the soldier next to which was yelled a cheer and the rider further down the line. The shots rang out clear in the crisp air and as the smoke cleared the men were seen to be hundreds of horses spurred on by the recruits of the army.

The man on the Kentucky thoroughbred had a good start and in a few minutes he was ten lengths in advance of the next rider, a tall cowboy who was on a chestnut horse.

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PREPARING FOR WAR

RUSSIA GETTING READY FOR A GREAT STRUGGLE.

Some Drastic Measures Adopted Preparatory to a Declaration of War—Steps Taken to Mobilize the Troops and Seize the Means of Transportation.

LONDON, April 15.—Advices received here from St. Petersburg state that the council of the empire has adopted a series of drastic measures which indicate that preparations are being made for war.

A plan has been approved by which all private railways and steamers will be turned over to the government in the event of a mobilization of the forces being ordered.
