

RUSSIAN'S THUMB UP

HE HAS NOT WITHDRAWN BUT PROPOSES TO STICK.

He Ate Lunch With Harrison and Talked With Him for an Hour, but They Are Still Enemies—What the Senators Say—Washington Is Very Much Bored.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—General Alger left here for New York at midnight last night. Before going he had conferences with Senators Stockbridge and McMillan during which his presidential candidacy was fully considered. General Alger leaves behind in a very much befogged public impression as to his intentions. This is so great that the Washington Star has this afternoon asserted that General Alger is out of the race and that President Harrison will be elected.

Senator Stockbridge, whose views are the result of his talk with General Alger last night, said: "General Alger does not intend to retire. On the contrary, he will remain in the race to the end, with a view to concentrating all the opposition to Harrison in one place, but one which the general is conducting in dead earnest. He has the support of Michigan, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, part of Missouri, and several localities which have shown anti-administration sentiment. The general is now alone in the field against Harrison and will continue to absorb all the elements of opposition. To be sure, General Alger lurches with the president, but a man can't decline a respectful invitation, and the lurch has no significance of an understanding between them.

ENGLAND PROZEN UP

THE SNOW STORM IS STILL RAGING.

Incuntable Danza to Frost and Growing Crops—Tentative Lines Destroyed—Traffic Extending to Europe—Northern France Reports Extreme Cold.

LONDON, April 18.—The unseasonable winter weather continues over Great Britain. Snow is falling here today in North Wales and the section of England adjoining. Many towns are isolated by heavy drifts, and are cut off from communication by the destruction of telegraph lines. In the county of Essex the snow, blackwater, ice, fog and other rivers have been swelled by the storms, and in many places the situation is flooded, in some parts the situation is serious.

The losses incurred by farmers and fruit growers will be very great, owing to the vegetables being either washed out of the ground or killed by frost. Fruit trees are being killed and the promise of an abundant crop of new blackened and will yield nothing. On the coast the wind has blown down the channel islands. On the island of Jersey, snow and frost are being reported. The weather is very cold. It is estimated that the loss on the potato crop will amount to \$1,000,000.

The cold shows no sign of abatement, in many places the ground is covered with snow. The crops in the north of France state that hail and ice are falling, and the weather is bitter and dreary. The wheat and corn crop will be a total loss.
