RUSSIAN TROOPS CHASE AUSTRIANS OFF THEIR TERRITORY.

An Austrian Commander Unwittingly Crosses the National Boundary With His Forces and is Driven Back to His Own Territory.

VIENNA, May 30.—A war between Russia and Austria came near being precipitated yesterday by a mistake of an Austrian general. The fact that the Austrian garrison of Brody, an important town of Galicia, about fifty-eight miles from the Austrian military headquarters at Lemberg, for Eastern Galicia was manufacturing Brody is only a few miles from the Russian-Polish frontier and in the course of tramping about the Austrian troops unwittingly crossed the frontier into Russian territory, a short distance from Radzivilov.

The whole frontier is patrolled by Cossack detachments and it did not take long for the Russian sentinels to spy the Austrian banderole on the Russian soil. The Cossacks hastened to report the commander of the garrison at Radzivilov, the troops were at once ordered to turn out prepared for battle. The Russian commander marshaled his men and they were ordered to follow him in the direction where the Austrians had been discovered. The Austrians, however, were not prepared for the Russian advance and they turned their faces at once toward the frontier. Just as they were approaching the distance at a double gait, but before the Russians got within a few miles of the frontier, the Austrians turned back on their own side of the line and there was no excuse for hostilities. THE MAD RUSH FOR OKLAHOMA

A Country Which Has Achieved Civilization While Six Weeks.

Oklahoma has emerged from the savagery and anarchy which attended a sturdy growth. Governor Sevier was caught in the saddle by a roving crowd on the other day and passed long enough in his tour of the territory which he failed to give his impressions of it.

"My headquarters are in the saddle," he explained, and then he said: "Three years ago the 21st of this month that portion of this territory which is now known as 'Old Oklahoma' was included only by jacks rabbits and Indians, with maybe an occasional blanket Indian or two. In my judgment this section now has between 75,000 and 80,000 population."

The governor admitted that the progress of the young state was being retarded by town lot controversies. At the time of the great rush it happened that nearly every section of ground in the new settlement was claimed by two or more persons. Town site boards were appointed to examine these claims and a great deal of litigation was the result. The town site boards, of course, were very general among settlers. The courts however, are passing on the claims rapidly.

Governor Sevier was of the opinion that Oklahoma as now constituted has a population of 100,000 to 115,000. He was asked what were the principal products of the territory, and replied: "Wheat we can raise almost anything the temperate zone produces. The great advantage we possess over other territory is the diversity of the crops we can produce. We are not content to wheat and corn, we can raise almost anything. We can and do produce a very superior article of cotton. Last year immense quantities of wheat were raised in this territory, but the low prices discouraged planters, and although the new settlers are being attracted to try again, acreage will be very materially reduced during this season.
