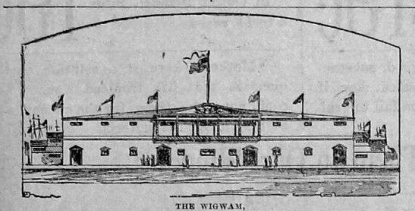


CONVENTION OPENS

WHY BLAINE QUIT. This reciprocity question is at the bottom of Blaine's madness and resignation. It is well known that Harrison, McKinley and Reid did not favor reciprocity and that Blaine jammed it into the McKinley bill by the force of his own efforts, despite the objections of the other eminent Republican leaders named.

Blaine is an earnest and ardent advocate of the good results of reciprocity, and not only favored it with Uruguay, Paraguay, Patagonia and other important countries, but also with Canada. The day he resigned a Canadian commission was in Washington to consider with the secretary of state the details of a reciprocity treaty with Canada.

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THAT DECISION AGAIN.

What are the facts about the "professional" laborer? The officers of the unions are not self appointed, they are elected, and I venture the assertion that the individual members of no other organizations in the world have so much power in choosing their officers as have the members of labor unions.

Now as to the goose and its golden egg. I admit the goose, but the golden egg is not to be had. However, the editorial simile in the Telegram's article is intended to convey the impression that organized labor by its methods, or to quote more closely, its "profession" methods—is doing itself harm in the face of good.
