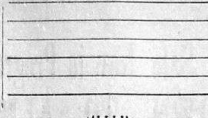

CURRENT STATE NEWS.

The Oswego Light Factory will erect an \$8,000 armory. The prohibition convention to nominate a state ticket will be held at Oswego August 10. Otto Hanner, aged 39, was drowned Tuesday at Manistee in Manistee lake. The fourth infantry reunion will be held at Lansing, September 13, the second day of the state fair. Harrisville, Ann Arbor, Hbaca, Norwalk, Holland, Ann Arbor, Grand Haven elected solid delegations for Richardson. Today will be a big day in Davidson for the local Macabees and are going to hold a regular knock down and drag out picnic. Ravul Vall, Seymour McLeod and Jerry Murphy of Au Sable, while bathing in Lake Huron Tuesday were drowned. Daniel Hogan, of Genesee has sued the D. G. H. & M. railroad company for a locomotive. Rush Bartlett of Bay City shot his 10 and 7-year-old son fatally yesterday and then made an unsuccessful attempt on his own life. Oswego has nine labor unions, representing with their families about 3,000 people. The clerks' union, recently formed, has 75 enrolled. Bill Nye was convicted in the Kalamazoo Police Court Tuesday on the charge of carrying concealed weapons. While bathing in the river at Cheboygan Tuesday morning, the 11-year-old son of P. M. Maloney was drowned. The Postawatomie Indians of Athens have been awarded \$1,010,676 to pay

for lands taken from them by the government many years ago. Anna Pratt of Bay City, a married woman, aged 28, died Monday night from the effects of a dose of six tacks taken with suicidal intent. Rev. Henry Geisler, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Dexter, has resigned his charge and will engage in newspaper work at Holland. Seth Raymond, of Cheboygan, a brakeman on the C. & W. M., had his leg crushed by the cars, and while undergoing amputation at Traverse City Tuesday night, he died. C. K. Keys, a retired merchant of Bronson, has been under treatment at a Chicago institution for the liquor and tobacco habit, and thinks he is permanently cured. Five hundred convicts, members of the Union Literary society at the state prison, assembled in the chapel Tuesday night to listen to Frank A. Dixon lecture on "Land and Sea." Rev. Otto Frenschberger of Frankenmuth died Tuesday morning at the advanced age of 83 years. He was one of the founders of the Missouri synod and was well known and respected. At the school meeting Monday night at Allegan Mrs. L. S. Burton was elected a member of the school board. This is the first time a lady has been selected for the position in that town. A special session was held at Allegan Monday to elect a village trustee in place of G. C. Powers, who resigned. A lively time was had but G. W. Damphly was elected by seventy-two votes. Jonathan J. Woodman, of Van Buren, and Dr. Henry P. Thomas, of Allegan, are mentioned in connection with the congressional seat now held over by Julius Cesar Burrows in the Fourth district. Robert F. Smith of Ypsilanti, afternoon by trade, fell off a house Tuesday, carrying a distance of twenty feet, and sustained injuries which will probably result in his death. He leaves a family. The Champlain valley at Ithaca closed down Tuesday, throwing several hundred men out of work. It is probably the worst snow storm in years and also close within a few days, throwing 3,000 more out of employment. Mrs. Anna Ward of Battle Creek suddenly strangled a clothing dealer named Mass on the public street Friday, breaking a hairpin to pieces over his chest and shoulders. He had some uncomplimentary remarks about her. At a meeting of the Coldwater city council Monday evening a resolution was passed asking the mayor to appoint a vigilance committee to look after the saloons, as it is claimed that they are selling liquor in defiance of the local option.
