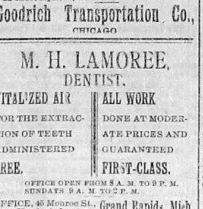
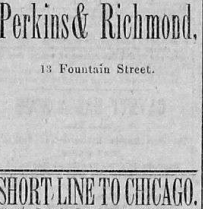

"I am very sorry for people in Philadelphia who understand accurately the condition of affairs at Homestead at present, or what it has been recently. # HOLIDAYS FOR WORKERS.

## What the Operatives and Laborers in England Got in This Way.

A recent letter from a London correspondent of a New York daily paper contains the following:

"The demand for an 'eight hours day,' which just now in some thirty-five or forty constituencies is causing more commotion than the home rule question, is only one of the many indications of the change which has of late years come over the English working classes."

The Amalgamated Society of Engineers inaugurated the nine hours' movement on Tuesday, nearly two years ago, and the ten hours day was the result. The day laborer's movement worked until as late as 6 o'clock on Saturday evening. The nine hours' movement, however, quickly extended itself to other industries than that of engineering, and before it had been in force five years with the men who had brought about about fifty-four hours had almost universally come to be regarded as the working week; wages were fixed upon that basis and overtime paid at an extra rate on all time worked beyond that limit.

When the change was first brought about work was usually continued until 12 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, but by a series of rearrangements things have been so adjusted that in nearly every industry the work ceases at noon on Saturday. It is while this movement toward a shorter working week and the Saturday half holiday has been going on that the railway companies have established itself with artisans and day laborers, and ceased to be what it was in the earlier years, the operation of the Lull-back act—a holiday mainly with the business and clerking classes.
