

A GREAT LAKE FERRY

New Boats Building for the T. & A. Railroad. It is Proposed to Ferry Loaded Cars Across Lake Michigan.

Toledo, O., Aug. 7.—Preparation is being made, and the experiment will be tested during this fall and winter, to deal the shipping interests of the great lake out of the severe blow that that industry has just received from the railroads.

It has always been difficult, in fact practically impossible, for the roads to compete successfully with the boats on the north-west and bringing down ore from the Upper Peninsula, and the transportation of these commodities has furnished the vessels with their principal cargo.

Each of the packages freight carried by the swift steamships is hardly anything for vessels to take from Lake Erie to Lake Michigan and Superior excepting coal.

It is at this traffic that the railroads are casting their eyes, and an attempt to gather it in is now being prepared for.

At the yard of the Craig Ship Building company in Toledo there are under construction two large and powerful shaped hulls. They are 250 feet long, 32 feet beam and 19 feet deep, and will cost when completed about \$183,000 each.

They are for the Toledo, Ann Arbor & North Michigan railroad, and will be completed this fall. They are being built by the managers of that road except to gather a large share of the coal and also the ore traffic which is now moved by water.

Each of the steamers will be fitted with four tracks and will be capable of carrying 34 cars. They will run about 30 miles an hour and will be operated between Frankfort and Kewanee, a route just 60 miles long and can be covered in about an hour.

The projectors of the scheme figure that cars can be taken across at a cost of about 1 cent a ton per mile. When bulk is broken, this refers to the handling of general merchandise, which will be carried in bulk, and the best results are looked for.

At present coal is taken to Toledo in bulk, and is discharged in a wharf, or directly into vessels, taken to some uplake port, unloaded on a pier, and then taken to some destination. Every standard cost time and money both in labor and in material is saved by the use of the new route. The cars will be taken to Frankfort, across the lake, and from there to Kewanee, where they will be unloaded. In the same way they will be brought back, and the saving effected by the railroad men is very considerable.

The building of these steamers is by no means an easy task. They are of light draft, and must carry a very clumsy cargo, all on deck, or, in fact, a large part of the cargo must be hoisted to cradle through all the ice which may oppose them in winter, but the most serious work is done in the summer, when the calm, quiet during heavy weather. THE LOWER USE

Text of the New Apportionment Bill. It Seems to Be Based Upon a Fair Interpretation of the Law.

Section 1. The people of the state of Michigan elect that the house of representatives shall hereafter be composed of 100 members elected agreeable to the ratio of one representative to every 30,000 inhabitants, and that the number of Indian descent not members of any tribe, in each organized county, and one representative of each county having a fraction more than a moiety of said ratio.

A PRINTER IN JAIL

A Managon Man Attempts to Print Reeds of the Daily Dagblags in Paris. He Writes of the French "Fourth of July."

PARIS, France, July 16, 1892.—[Special correspondence]—The great "Fete Nationale," the celebration of the anniversary of the storming and destruction of the Bastille by the people on the 14th of July, 1789, is just over. The "Bastille St. Antoine" was a castle or stronghold erected in 1371 to garrison by the Kings Charles V. and VI. and in later times used as a state prison, chiefly for the maintenance of the rank and file of the army. It had fallen victim to the intrigues of the court or caprice of the government. It had massive walls 10 feet in thickness, with eight towers or bastions, and was placed on the summit of the canon on the top of the city, and the cannon on its battlements commanded the adjoining suburb of St. Antoine, the quarter occupied by the artisan class. It was a standing representation of despotic power, and very soon after the revolution, when the people arose and resounded throughout all Paris: "Down with the Bastille!" It was stormed and captured by the people after a desperate struggle.

Preparation for the "Fete" were begun several days before the 14th and were made on a grand scale. Large poles were set in the pavements and stands erected at numerous points where the great avenues intersect the boulevards. The rear of the city was set up along the avenues and boulevards where light goods of almost all kinds were exposed for sale. Swings, merry-go-rounds, shooting galleries and all manner of devices for pleasure and amusement were placed along the boulevards. Grand ovens were set up where men were engaged in baking and dispensing to the crowds large soft cakes.

Private decoration of both public and private buildings was done in a very tasteful manner and on a scale far exceeding anything I ever saw in our own country. The French tri-color floated from all places, from the great palaces and churches to the humblest dwellings, and everywhere where the patriots pass a cheerless life. The patriotic feeling was at high tide. The government appropriated 150,000 francs (\$30,000) to cover the expense of the great decorations of the city.

On the night of the 13th there was a grand torch light procession in which the different trades took part. On the afternoon of the 14th the grand review of the army by the president took place on the "Champ de Mars" and the racing ground of the Bois de Boulogne. Fully 50,000 troops, infantry, cavalry and artillery took part and the marching and evolutions were very fine. The review France has a splendid army. The illuminations on the night of the 14th were beyond anything I had ever seen or imagined. The "Place de la Concorde" and the "Garden of the Tuilleries" were brilliantly lit up. The annual receipts of the city from all these sources under the head of "Fetes Nationales" is \$1,200,000.
