

STRIKERS GOING BACK

Some of the Lehigh Men Are Weak Kneed.

Probability of an Early Collapse of Buffalo's Labor War.

BUFFALO, 12 midnight.—The conference between the labor leaders, which has been in progress since this afternoon and evening, was unfavorable for the switchmen. Grand Master Sweeney has just announced that he formally calls the strike off.

BUFFALO, Aug. 24.—The strike is rapidly collapsing. The new men sent to the pits and the other work being done, and have been given transportation. The old men are desirous of going back to work, and have initiated negotiations to that end with a prospect of success.

THEY COLLECT UP A BARR

Some Supplies for Carnegie Destroyed.

The Imprisoned Workmen in the Mill Get Into a Panic and Fight.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 24.—A car loaded with steel logs consigned to the Carnegie firm at the Thirty-third street works was blown up with dynamite or some other explosive on a side track of the Allegheny Valley railroad at Thirty-fourth street last night.

The body of the car was badly shattered and the contents scattered in all directions.

So far as can be ascertained no one was injured. A reserve force of police was summoned and quickly surrounded the place, but no one was captured.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 23.—When the dynamite explosion occurred at the Twenty-ninth street mill last night, destroying a car loaded with steel logs, many of the non-union men were asleep in their bunks inside the mills. They became terror-stricken and made a rush for the gates.

Superintendent Wright, who was at the main gate engaged in conversation with a watchman, quickly closed the gate and locked it. At the same time some one turned off the electric light current and the entire mill and yards were in darkness which added to the confusion.

The non-union men engaged in a free-for-all fight, which lasted nearly half an hour. During the fight many of the men were badly, and in a few cases, seriously injured. Many of the men were taken to the hospital to receive medical attention. Others received injuries so serious that they require their removal to the hospital.

This morning the workmen discovered the cause of the explosion. They threw him out of the mill yard and his clothing after him. No attempt was made to arrest him. The mill yard is a labyrinth of mills and everything is quiet. The police guard has, however, been increased at several points as an extra safeguard.

STOLE GAS.

How Toledo Business Men Defrauded the City.

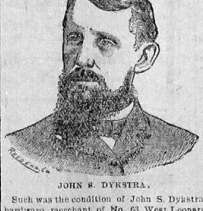
