

WANT OVER THE RECORD People's Party Men Leave "The Middle of the Road."

Chas D. Stebbins for Treasurer and Dr. Bradish for Coroner.

SHREVEPORT, La., Aug. 25.—(Special) The first county nominating convention of the People's party convened at exactly 3:30 yesterday afternoon in a room adjacent to the Good Templar hall on South Division street. There were 74 delegates present besides many of the whorps of Democracy who occupied the space in the rear of the room and looked on anxiously at the proceedings.

The city delegation seemed to be divided into two factions that could be styled liberal and conservative. The liberals favored the alliance with Democracy and the conservative wing was "whole hog or none." The test of strength came in the election of delegates at large and when D. W. Cartwright's name was mentioned the conservatives declined to jump on him with both feet but he escaped defeat by the "skin of his teeth." Jacob Tazelaar was the target for the conservative shafts and fell by the wayside plucked by the "fox."

The convention was gloriously enthusiastic and there were more candidates than muskets in Jersey. Everything went with a rush and a push that demonstrated beyond peradventure that strong and hearty men were at the helm and intended, if they found it impossible to steer the boat through the reefs, they would pick it up and lift it over.

At exactly 5:30 Chairman Paul Martin dropped the gavel and Secretary J. W. Clayton read the call. After the reading of the call W. F. Teas and John Burrows were named for temporary chairman and as the convention seemed to be divided into two factions Dr. Bradish was declared the choice by a vote of 55 to 19.

Mr. Burrows expressed the usual thanks for the honor and asked the pleasure of the convention. John Burrows was then elected temporary secretary and then the "wagon committee" to roll.

The names of members of the different committees fell to the lot of the presiding officer, notwithstanding the attempt was made to have them elected by ballot. The following is the personnel:

HAMBURG, Aug. 25.—One hundred and sixty-nine bodies of cholera victims are awaiting burial in this city. So great is the terror caused by the cholera that it is difficult to get men for the work of burying the dead and many assistants of undertakers have deserted their places of employment. Business is prostrated and shipping is going to other ports. So serious is the panic that Russian emigrants now in the city find it difficult to procure food, as everybody tries to avoid them.

AUGIE CLAIR SUICIDES A Victim of Marital Infidelity Takes Her Own Life.

Regarding the death of Alice Clair of 800 North Lafayette street which occurred yesterday morning from the effects of a violent poison taken with suicidal intent, there is a sad story which shows the uncertainty of marital fidelity.

About a year ago it was publicly known that the deceased and her husband had separated. The husband had happily together. Twice she applied for a divorce, but upon the promise of her husband to reform and for the sake of their children, she refrained.

She was not happy even after this suit was withdrawn and could hardly be called good friends. Mrs. Clair appeared to brood over her trouble and several times told her neighbors she would commit suicide if she thought she could make a success of it.

On Tuesday evening of last week she was seen entering her home with a bundle of morphine, went home and after taking several doses retired to her bedroom and swallowed the deadly drug.

Her husband was not present at the time of the tragedy and it is believed he was called by her to see her before she died. The cause of death was ascertained by a physician but he declined to give details.

There was no note or letter left explaining her conduct, but the neighbors claim she had been led to the cruel conduct of her husband.
