Dixon the Winner of Last Night's Bout.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 6.—The second of the three great pugilistic contests took place tonight between Jack Skelly of Boston and George Dixon, the hitherto invincible colored feather weight. The fight was for the featherweight championship of the world, a stake of \$5,000 and a side purse of \$750 added to the Olympic club. Contrary to the established custom here a portion of the spectators was ejected from the arena and the fight was fairly well attended. They were enthusiastic supporters of Dixon going without saying. The bout was entirely in Dixon's favor, odds of three to one being freely offered by few takers.

Dixon's second were M. J. Kelly, Jack Havenin and Thomas O'Rourke. Jack's dougherty acted as bottle holder, M. J. Bradin time keeper. Dixon's weight was 116 1/2 pounds.

Dixon entered the ring amid cheering at 8 o'clock. He was followed a few minutes later by Skelly and his seconds. Councilman Charley Dixon addressed the 6,000 people, asking them to be ejected and to allow Johnny Duffy to strike the man.

The Electric Street Mill Transmogrified. The Thomson-Houston company has completed and put into operation the first electric mill transmogrified in Chicago, and the Northwestern Terra Cotta plant. This line is 1,700 feet long, including the loop. The overhead conductor consists of two No. 3 B. & S. gauge copper wires. The power is supplied from an incandescent lighting plant it was deemed advisable not to use any other and rail for return current, so a double trolley system was installed. The line has six curves of less than forty feet radius.

A local train can start from the works and unload in the storage yard and continue to the clay sheds for a return haul for the works. The track is advanced to the north end of the mill on pine ties, spaced two feet between centers. The greatest grade is 4 per cent. The motor car is equipped with two 2-horsepower railroad motors, mounted on the axles. The motor has hauled ten tons on a level track.—New York Telegram.
