The City Will Improve
Grand River.

Enthusiasm Aroused by Another Grand Inspection Trip.

Nature could not have done more than it did yesterday to make pleasant the trip down the river on the steamer Valley City given by the board of directors, city officials and other prominent citizens. The day was charming, the air mild and bracing and the scenery beautiful.

Grand river from here to the mouth presents a grand panorama of nature's most beautiful features. The trees are in their full summer garb of green, not a leaf has been touched by autumn with its gay but fatal colors. And then such lovely and stately trees as they are and here a sycamore on the low ground stands as lofty as the elms. The water edge is fringed with willows and beyond, the higher ground is ornamented with giant oaks and handsome maples, chestnuts, firs, hemlocks, spruces, pines, oaks, birches, alders and various other trees that break upon the view with every bend of the noble stream.

The Valley City is a perfect vessel for the route to Grand Haven. She is a fine craft and offers every pleasure possible for a trip that is otherwise exulting. Captain Mitchell was in command, and landed the party at Grand Haven in five and a half hours from the start. Captain Van Arman, the steamer's officer, and not getting a response he pronounced the steamer as being "wrecked" and was passing Spring Lake.

On the head board Ferryburg the "Valley City" was met by the "Spirit" with Mayor Kirby of Grand Haven, Excelsior Ferry, Collector of Customs Michigan, and other officials. The "Spirit" was 30 feet deep of water, the width being 400 feet.

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THE CHOLERA SCARE HAS NOT AS YET HAD VERY MUCH EFFECT.

New York, Sept. 16.—Bradstreet's State of Trade tomorrow will show: Among eleven Southern cities, New Orleans reports checked trade, due to bad weather and some "scare" about cholera, and Birmingham, Ala., says trade quiet, country merchants buying but sparingly. Memphis, Louisville, Nashville, Charleston, Savannah, Atlanta, Galveston, Dallas, all say that general business is better than it is. Trade is active, or is encouraging as to outlook, with moderately prompt collections.

There is relatively more activity and increase in volume of business in Chicago, Omaha, Milwaukee and Duluth than at St. Paul and Minneapolis. The latter report business in fair volume with jobbers buying. At the Inter-Ocean metropolis the volume of trade in dry goods, notions, millinery and kindred lines exceeds that of all the preceding seasons, and the same is true of the Nebraska trade center. Jobbers at the "Zenth City" are extending their trade and the territory, which they supply. Iron is in better demand west.

The appearance of cholera in New York was used by the bear element generally in an effort to depress prices, though with only temporary effect. There is no "scare" reported in merchandise markets and Duluth has expected. More anticipation of such reports appears to have been noticed at other cities with reference to New York than at the metropolis.

Paper stock and chemicals are higher, as foreign markets are obtainable. Bags are up to \$30 per ton. Price of paper must advance soon. Some imported fabrics have been advanced, owing to denials and formalities surrounding them. Foreign hides and skins are soon to be advanced in price.

A notable falling off in trade among dealers in fallacious is noted. Sugar and other commodities are in demand. Foreign hides and skins are soon to be advanced in price.

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
