

IT WAS A CLOSE SHAVE

But Richardson is Elected Sure Enough.

The Republicans Elect All the County Officers With Three Exceptions.

The counting of the ballots in the city Ottawa completed last night after a long and trying morning.

The friends of Mr. Belknap were badly discouraged at 3 o'clock and went home fully convinced that he was beaten by four to six hundred plurality.

When they came down during the forenoon, however, and found that Richardson had not over 1,300 in the city they began to "figger" and bustle for returns from the townships and precincts.

For several hours there was doubt as to the result, Belknap's plurality in Township 10 being reported at only 200. It is now rumored that he would have 150 in Ottawa county.

Early in the evening some of the committee met together and comparing notes it was found that they had as good as official returns on the occasional score from every precinct in Kent and Ottawa counties.

Richardson's net plurality—1,274. Belknap's plurality—1,136. Kent county—1,274. Ottawa county—1,136.

THE COUNTY.

The Republicans have elected their county officers with the exception of treasurer, one circuit court commissioner and one coroner—Stebbins, Comstock and Bradish respectively.

Stebbins, Comstock and Bradish have about 400 each. The Republicans elected have pluralities ranging from 150 on Superior to 850 for circuit court commissioner.

Senator Doran has a plurality of over 200. Union polled 100, exceptions of white (Dem.) in the Seventeenth senatorial district.

ENGLISH COTTON STRIKE.

A Victory for the Operatives Considered a Practical Certainty.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Mr. Mawdsley, secretary of the Amalgamated Association of Operative Cotton Spinners, thinks that 125,000 persons will be rendered idle by the lockout or strike, the trouble paralyzing of both features. His estimate, however, may be modified should the struggle among the employers spread.

The Federation of Master Cotton Spinners has never been very successful in its lockouts, and the present trouble promises to be no exception to the rule. Since the masters issued their notice that the spinners would have to submit to a 5 per cent. reduction in their wages, there has been a considerable improvement in the cotton trade, and manufacturers are loath to shut their mills and forego the profits in sight.

Each manufacturer belonging to the Masters' Federation pays a fine of one farthing for each spindle he runs during the lockout, but it is evident that on the present occasion many of them can pay the wages demanded by the spinners and still run their mills at a satisfactory profit. If this were not the case the mills would be closed.

Mr. Mawdsley said tonight that the employees of the cotton mills are anxious to see the strike end as a struggle that might perhaps last through the whole winter. They were, therefore, willing to accept the terms of arbitration with representatives of the Masters' Federation, but with nobody else.

MAY FIGHT IN FEBRUARY. Corbett Will Act as His Backer, Phil Dwyer Says.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—It appears as if Jim Corbett will reconsider his determination to not fight again for another year.

When a reporter told Corbett that a cablegram had been received from London to the effect that both Mitchell and Jim Hall had decided to leave the contest which will take place in Corbett and Fitzsimmons and upon receipt of this information Hall would post \$5,000 and Mitchell \$200,000 respectively to bind a match with the Australian and the Californian, Corbett smiled grimly and said:

"This to all apparatus snarls of legitimate business and I like to hear Mitchell talk that way. But I won't do anything until the Englishman puts up his forfeit and sells for America."

"I will consult my backer, Phil Dwyer, and every man says in the matter will be law with me. If he says that I should fight Mitchell in February I will do so. If he advises me to the contrary I will act accordingly. It remains with Mr. Dwyer whether I shall cancel my engagements with Jim Mitchell in February or not."

WONT COME FORSTER. Meaullis and Meyer Will Not Meet in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The prospects of Jack Meaullis and Billy Meyer coming together in a long ground campaign at St. Louis in a little dim, as the champion is holding out for threefourths of the gate receipts. Alf Kennedy, Meyer's manager, in answer to a letter received from the East a few days ago, wired Meaullis's manager that his terms were 60 and 40 per cent. of the gate receipts which he received the following telegram yesterday:

Best terms, 15 and 25 Meaullis; boxing champion, is a great card; meeting four weeks hence; six fights.

SAID TO BE \$400,000 SHORT. Ward & Co's Confidential Clerk Charged With a Big Defalcation.

REID WONT SURRENDER.

The Editor-Candidate Still Fighting for Favorable Status.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Whitlaw Reid, the defeated candidate for the vice presidency, would not acknowledge his defeat even at noon today. He was still under the impression that there was a chance.

Mr. Reid set up until 5 o'clock this morning receiving returns from Chairman Carter, of the national Republican committee, by telephone. Naturally they were of a very partisan character, and when Mr. Reid went to bed he still had hopes. He sat in the library reading a novel during the early hours of the morning at his Optima farm residence, and Secretary Tyson brought him the messages from New York.

"When I got the last message last night," said Mr. Reid, "Chairman Carter and I were satisfied that Indiana and Illinois were doubtful, and up to this hour I am still of the same opinion. New York state was conceded to the Democrats last night when the first returns began to come in."

He declined to express an opinion upon this point, for he was not satisfied that the fight had been lost. Mr. Reid had no fault to find with the national committee. Even when he found that New York state had gone Democratic he was not discouraged, as he believed Illinois would settle the question in favor of his party.

A GREAT CASE UNDETERMINED. Twenty-Four Large and Beautiful Rooms Found Without Aid of Pick or Shovel.

HARRISONBURG, Va., Nov. 9.—A cave has been discovered about six miles east of Harrisonburg, near the village of Keelstown. It has not been fully explored yet, but it is said to rival the Treasury cavern in size and grotesque and in beauty. It is situated on the national road, and was discovered by the workmen while blasting rock. Twenty-four rooms have been found without the aid of pick or shovel. Persons from the neighborhood are flocking to see it. Specimens of stalactites were brought into town.

A HOME FOR THE CELESTIALS. Brazil is Anxious to Secure Chinese Immigration.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Just at this time, when the United States is embarrassed by the necessity of keeping Chinese laborers out of the country, it is a rather fortunate occurrence for the Chinese that the Brazilian government, according to a dispatch sent to the state department by United States Minister Cooper, has just passed an act for the encouragement of Chinese immigration.

The minister writes that it is expected that the new act will induce a considerable immigration.

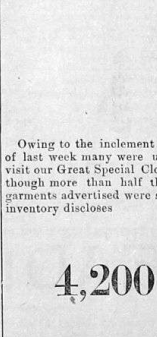
THE MISSING STEAMSHIP. Sighted Nine Hundred Miles Off With Healed Machinery.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—A cable from the Tontonic, which arrived at London today, announces that she sighted the missing steamship Enland 900 miles off sea three days ago. Her machinery was disabled. She did not need help. The Italy, which sailed yesterday, was ordered to keep about look out for the Enland and if necessary to go out of her regular track. The Canada of the same line, from London, has the same orders. Much anxiety is felt regarding the fate of the vessel.

SEAMEN'S WAGES GO UP. The Lake Carriers Finance Committee Decide on an Advance.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 9.—The finance committee of Lake Carriers' association has advanced the wages of keelmen, firemen, wheelmen, lookouts, deck hands and others on steamers, and second mates, seamen and boys on tug-boats and consortia. The wages of the firemen, wheelmen, lookouts and seamen were advanced 25 cents a day, and tugsport deck hands and boys a month. The new schedule goes into effect Thursday next.

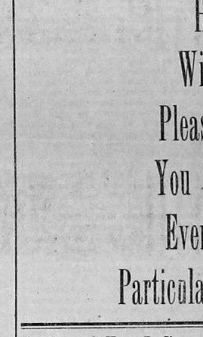

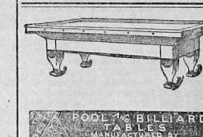
