PRESENT AND FUTURE ISSUES.

The election of Mr. Cleveland puts aside forever anything like the so-called Force Bill devised by Davenport and more intended to suppress Tammany than to protect legal voters in the South. This fact remaining constant, the program in the campaign, that in all probability will have to be met during the next two years, are the reform of the tariff, silver coinage and the currency question. The reform of the tariff. Democrats have a delicate matter to handle, but the responsibility is upon them and they will have to take it. If they change they make prove beneficial and are attended by Cleveland's lack of interest in the country generally they will not be cast out again on the tariff question.

Mr. Cleveland is likely to have good standing in his previous commitments by messages, speeches and letters. The Harrison monetary commission soon to assemble at Brussels for the purpose of settling upon an international basis for the coinage of silver and gold, will fall to agree, as at least three similar commissions have failed in the past. This must be the last attempt of the United States in that direction and the free coinage of silver will be a question for any longer to await an international treaty. It will be seen that the creditor class of America is bent on the robbery of America with the single standard of gold to convert to it. The Democrats in congress with the Populists and the silver republicans will agree upon a silver coinage act and if it recedes it will pass nevertheless.

Then will come the currency question. The Democrats are pledged to a repeal of the 10 per cent. tax on state bank issues. A bill for that purpose will be introduced, and in the course of its passage amendments will be substituted that will call out a full discussion, going fully over the subject of what shall be the permanent currency of the nation in the future. State bank notes, national bank notes and the federal reserve notes will all be proposed and opposed. In that battle Trust Monarchs possess a confident the greenback will win and Mr. Cleveland will be convinced it is wisdom to let it win. The result will be a new issue of currency that will make good times and, with the reform of the tariff, lower taxation to the entire pleasure of the people.

Whatever the effect it should come in time for the country to convene congress in extra session.

It should be remembered that although Cleveland's treatment and congress in both branches is anti-Republican, there will be no change in legislation affecting the tariff, or in fact anything else, for 15 months yet, unless an extra session is called.
