

DEATH OF JAY GOULD

Wall Street's Wizard Has "Passed in His Checks."

The Great Multi-Millionaire a Victim of Pulmonary Consumption.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Jay Gould, the greatest financier that the United States has ever known, died last night at his residence at 912 1/2 o'clock this morning. His end was peaceful. Twelve hours before his death he was prostrated by a nervous attack, and his physician, Dr. Mun, was summoned. Every member of the Gould family was also summoned and they watched at his bedside until the end came.

The death of the great financier inspired an universal regret, but it did not cause any sensational break in the market, which, for 20 years, he was the most important figure. The market was not even shaken, mainly because Mr. Gould had provided against it by placing his immense fortune in the hands of men whose integrity he trusted. There was no considerable sale of securities known as Gould stocks and no attempt to force a panic was made.

It was believed that he died this morning that Mr. Gould was going to "had been prostrated several days before he died." The report that he had last night was thought to be a mere rumor, merely temporary. Mr. Gould was first seized with illness on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock while in his room with his daughter, Mrs. Edw. Gould, who had just returned on a trip to the South on her father's boat. He had been ill for several days and he had been unable to get up for several days. He was taken to his room last night Mr. Gould became ill and he died at 9 o'clock this morning. He was 65 years of age.

At 8:45 o'clock the butler of the Gould household appeared at the door and said that Mr. Gould was not coming to work today. At 9:15 o'clock the shades of the windows on the Fifth avenue side of the house were lowered and it was taken to mean that Mr. Gould was dead. A few minutes later the butler came out and said that Mr. Gould was dead. When the news of the great financier's death reached the street there were parades of people gathered in front of the house and in the corridors of the Windsor hotel. General regret and sympathy were expressed by the thousands of people who lifted their hats and stood with bowed heads for an instant.

His Tomb. The Mausoleum More Magnificent Than That of Napoleon III. Mr. Gould's funeral will take place at 10 o'clock Monday. Rev. Dr. Paxton and Turner, with Chaplain McCracken of the New York university, will conduct the funeral services. The remains were allowed to remain in the room in which he died after the undertaker had removed the body. The remains will rest in the mausoleum overlooking the banks of the Hudson which was completed only a short time ago. With the exception of the Vanderbilt mausoleum this is the most magnificent tomb in America. The interior is a delight to the eye of the sculptor and the architect. Thousands of dollars were also expended by the great railroad king in the erection of the tomb, and it is said that the Mausoleum, the Egyptian tower from whom the mausoleum derives its name, cost \$1,000,000. It is the most magnificent of its kind in the world. Mr. Gould's body was buried in the Mausoleum at 10 o'clock Monday.
